GREAT BRITAIN'S foreign commerce equals about one-sixth of our domestic commerce.

In 1880 the whole known world did not lay as many miles of track as were laid across this country.

It is asserted that in the city of Leeds, England, with a population of 320,000, not one laboring man or mechanic owns his home, while in Philadelphia, under the American protective system, 170,000 homes are owned by working people.

It is reported that Nansen, the explorer, has accomplished the journey across Greenland on inland ice, and has arrived safely at Godthaab, on the west coast of Greenland. The journey was made on snow shoes, with the purpose of exploring the unknown interior of Greenland.

Tin plate is ninety-five per cent. iron, and five per cent tin and lead. The tin plate trust in England sends 325,000 tons of iron, free of duty into this country, because it has put a little tin and lead upon it. We should import tin, and do our own tinning until our beds of tin ore are more fully developed.

There is probably interesting election news yet to come as the Republicans have determined to contest the electoral vote of Virginia, and the Democrats will try and tie the Delaware legislature on joint ballot by contesting the election of A. B. Richardson in favor of D. M. Ridgely, and thus prevent the election of a Republican United States senator, by placing the appointment in the hands of the governor who would be expected to name a Democrat.

The assistant secretary of the treasury has sent the following important ruling to the collector of customs at San Francisco: "Chinese merchants are not affected by the exclusion act of the 1st ult. Those now resident in the United States who visit foreign countries may be admitted on their return upon any evidence of identity satisfactory to the collector." It is likely that under this ruling there will be a large increase in the number of Chinese merchants visiting this coast.

An interesting ruling has been made by the treasury department. On October 8, Rev. Miller brought from Europe a seal ring for the Rt. Rev. Abiel Leonard, missionary bishop of Nevada and Utah. The collector of customs at New York assessed and collected \$20 duty on the ring. Bishop Leonard thereupon appealed to the treasury department, claiming the ring was especially imported to be used in attesting official documents by him in his ecclesiastical capacity. The department affirmed his appeal and directed that the duty be refunded.

SPEAKING of the election, Senator Stanford says: "The victory of the Republican party has certainly been a sweeping one. It settles very emphatically the issue of protection versus free trade. General Harrison will make an admirable president. He is a man of strong convictions, though eminently reasonable. No power on earth, however, would force him to take any action which he believed wrong. He is a practical, cool, common sense statesman, who improves on acquaintance."

The interstate commerce commission has ruled that it cannot authoritatively interfere with the regulations of the immigrant commissioners at Castle Garden, New York, in the matter of arrangement for ticketing immigrants by rail to interior points, because these commissioners are appointed by the state and their control of immigration has been sanctioned by the government. The interstate commission further hold that there is nothing illegal or wrongful in a railroad company making a rate for immigrants, as a class, and declining to give the same rate to others.

The Clackamas Salmon Hatchery.

There never was a finer lot of young salmon to be seen anywhere in the world than are now at the salmon hatchery on the Clackamas river. They are all of them in perfect condition both as to health and looks. Of the several millions in the hatching house, there is not a single lot, however small, that is not doing well. Five million eggs have been taken at this station this year and placed in the hatching troughs. The first half million taken early in the season when the Clear creek water, which supplies the hatchery house, was warm, did not thrive, but as soon as this was discovered, temporary hatching quarters were built in the Clackamas river, and in a small brook emptying into Clear creek near the hatchery, and after that the eggs did finely; and now that the water of Clear creek is cold again, all the eggs and fish at the station are in splendid condition. The whole output for the season

will be about 4,000,000 fish. About 500,000 have already been deposited at various points up and down Clear creek and the Clackamas river, and about 3,500,000 are left to be turned over to the state commissioners when they come to occupy the station again on the 15th of this month.

Notwithstanding the unpromising outlook at the beginning of the season the Clackamas hatchery has proved itself to be a success, and will probably turn out more Chinook salmon this season than any other salmon hatching station in North America.

Drowning of F. E. McKinnon.

Coroner Suprenant returned from Sunshine, yesterday afternoon bringing with him the body of F. E. McKinnon, mention of whose death was made in Sunday's ASTORIAN. It seems that last Friday morning he was returning from his timber claim on the Nasel river, and had his gun with him to shoot ducks. When he had got to the mouth of the river he was seen by persons at Mrs. Smith's place on the opposite side. He was seen running up and down the beach and was heard shouting to his dog. Soon after he was seen to push his boat out into the river and after getting a short distance from the shore he sank out of sight, reappeared and sank again but came up no more. The alarm was given and the body was recovered. It showed no signs of injury. His gun was found beside him. Dr. Fulton decided that he came to his death by drowning. Deceased was a strong, able-bodied man and carried a medal he had won in a swimming contest. It is supposed he became chilled in the cold water and so perished. His premature death is sincerely regretted as he was a young man who was well liked in the community where he lived. His brother will take the body to San Francisco on the Columbia to-day, where his parents reside. His mother is reported to be lying at the point of death and his father is quite feeble.
