Speaking of the Chinese hospital which is to be built at Portland, the Oregonian says: "The hospital will not only be a home for the sick, but also a retreat for the aged and infirm. It will be under the direct control of the Chinese Free Mason company and also under the jurisdiction of the city authorities. Well trained and efficient nurses will care for the sick and their native physicians will provide medical attendance. The grounds will be well kept up, and the entire institution will be under the supervision of some one who will be employed to remain on the premises and devote himself exclusively to its management. The institution will be supported by the Chinese themselves, both by assessments and through contributions from the different Chinese companies."
