The machinery is being taken out of the Rosie Olsen to make her just a simple, plain, ordinary schooner.

The postmaster general has ordered the establishment of free delivery at Spokane Falls and Walla Walla.

A woman of the town, Kate Murphy, known as Irish Kate, died last night, of chronic alcoholism, and was taken to the morgue.

Jos. Surprenant came up from Tanzy point yesterday. He says the water has been so rough there, that it was impossible to do any work with the driver.

The Telephone on her down trip yesterday passed the Emblem coming down in tow of the Lurline, and the Tringate in tow of the Dixie Thompson.

Rev. Mr. Zeller, who was a pastor at Montessau five years ago, came down on the Telephone yesterday, bringing the body of his wife, who is to be buried beside her child at Montessau.

Capt. James Carroll, is in Portland on his way to California, and says that he will go into the scheme to build a large steamer for the Alaska route; provided the other parties mentioned will go in with him.

The new steel steamer Islander, lately arrived in San Francisco from Glasgow, where she was built for the Canadian Pacific Navigation company, and will leave for Puget sound in a few days, where she will ply.

A pistol in the hands of a certain party—or rather uncertain party—on First street, was discharged last night, the bullet striking M. M. Dea, but as good fortune willed, it struck him on the cheek and glanced off without harming him.

A quantity of shafting, wheels, pulleys, and connections was brought down on the Telephone yesterday, for Fort Stevens. For want of definite information, it is surmised that it is a part of some arrangement for reducing the surplus.

Johnny Nelson fell overboard last evening from the Occident where she was lying at the foot of Cass street. He was about swallowing his last mouthful of water when a man aboard the Rosie Olsen close by, rescued him more dead than alive.

Among the bills introduced in the senate last Tuesday, was one by senator Dolph, giving the Astoria and South Coast railroad the right to construct their line across Young's bay, Clatsop county, Oregon. That's right, crowd the railroad business ahead as fast as possible.

The Oregon Iron and Steel company are turning out forty-eight tons of pig iron and twenty-five tons of iron pipe every day. The pipe is not made out of ordinary scrap and coke pig iron, but out of the best No. 1 charcoal pig iron and sells for \$90 per ton. They have enough ore in sight to run a furnace for their present capacity for 200 years. They employ 350 men and their pay roll amounts to \$28,000 per month.

The government has been building a wharf about two hundred and fifty feet in advance of the old wharf at Fort Stevens. The new structure is about sixty feet deep with a frontage of about 150 feet. The piles are driven from eight to twelve feet deep in the sticky black clay impregnated with iron, which forms the bottom of the river at that point. A force of some twenty men is employed and the work is being pushed to completion as rapidly as possible. When completed the new wharf will be connected with the old one by a double track railway. At present there is a depth of twenty feet at low water. Past experience warrants the belief that sand will be deposited around the new wharf in time, necessitating farther advance toward deep water.

DEATH OF JUDGE J. W. MOFFITT.

J. W. Moffitt, who has been an inmate of St. Mary's hospital for about a year, died yesterday morning at 8 o'clock, aged 83 years. The funeral will be from the hospital at 1:30 this afternoon; the interment at Clatsop. Jacob W. Moffitt was one of the pioneers of Clatsop county, coming here from Indiana with his wife about the year 1845. He settled on what is known as the Moffitt donation land claim, located between the south and east fork of the Wallucki at the head of steamboat navigation, where he made his home for some thirty years. His children were six in number, four daughters and two sons. Two of the daughters are dead, namely: the wife of Jas. A. Cook, and Captain P. E. Ferchen's first wife. Two are living in California, one being the wife of Ira McKean, who is a brother of S. T. McKean, of this city, the other, Mrs. Electra Beyington and David were the names of the two sons. The latter is dead, and the former is believed to be living in Washington territory.

Mrs. Captain Wes. Whitcomb is a granddaughter and there are many others, relatives whose names do not occur to the writer. He was an active and influential Mason, and it is believed is the last of the ten charter members of Temple Lodge No. 7, A. F. and A. M., of this city, which was organized Nov. 24, 1833. The following names appear as charter members: Freeman Farnsworth, Henry Martin, H. B. Somers, H. S. Aiken, J. B. Martin, W. S. Spratt, Thos. Goodwin, John Hunt, J. W. Moffitt, R. M. Moore. He was elected and served as treasurer of the Lodge till 1855 and was master of the Lodge for three terms, 1856, '64, '66. He was a zealous member of his lodge, and the weather was never too severe or the roads too difficult to prevent his unflinching attendance on Lodge night.

He was influential as a citizen, and held the office of county judge for two terms from 1854 to '58. He was also a member of the legislature. As a politician he was the acknowledged leader of Clatsop county Democracy. He possessed considerable ability as a public speaker, and was unusually entertaining in conversation. His wit, and humor, apt and ready quotations of prose and poetry, always held a crowd of interested listeners. Old timers who read these lines will recall the names of those who used to gather at Capt. Kippen's, in the Monitor, or in Megler's old Astoria House to listen to his entertaining speech.

In religion he was inclined to the liberal view of the Universalist belief and was fond of quoting lines from Burns that were in sympathy with his views. His wife died about ten years ago, and for several years past his mind has been weak so that he has been unfit for business, and the recollection of his former activity and usefulness was fast fading away. To-day many of his friends and former associates will follow him to his last resting place.

CHINESE HIGHBINDER MUST GO.

As might be expected the Chinese fight of Sunday afternoon has stirred up considerable feeling, says the Oregonian, not alone among the white people, but among the better class of Chinamen themselves. There are Chinese merchants in the city who are just as anxious to ferret out the perpetrators of these foul murders, and forever break up all highbinder societies, as are the best citizens of Portland. The Chinamen well know the consequences they would be called upon to meet had even one white person fallen a victim to their reckless fusillade of Sunday afternoon; and they also well know what is in store for them if such an event is allowed to occur again.

The Chinese business men and merchants will unite and give the authorities every assistance in their power to accomplish the work of breaking up all highbinder societies. The name of every highbinder society, with its location, were given chief Parrish and the war of extermination will soon commence. The Chinamen are all agreed that active steps should be taken at once. Notices will be posted on every door of these highbinder headquarters ordering them to disband within five days. These notices will be printed in the Chinese language, and, in addition to the seal of the Joss house company, will have the endorsement of mayor DeLashmunt and chief of police Parrish. Thus officially endorsed, these notices will carry the weight of coming from the highest authorities. If this order is not obeyed within the specified five days, if every sign is not taken down from their headquarters and there will thus be no chance for any to escape detection.

The black list will be made out at once, and every highbinder will be placed behind the prison bars. This course of action has received the sanction of the leading Chinese merchants and there will be no difficulties encountered in carrying it into execution.
