TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

United States War Steamers to Hayti.

CHICAGO, Dec. 11.—Two mysterious well dressed prisoners are under arrest, it is supposed for complicity in the Shufeldt dynamite explosion yesterday. Nothing definite to be learned.

WOMEN AT THE POLLS.

BOSTON, Dec. 11.—Stormy weather is unfavorable in influencing the vote in this city, though the women are casting a heavy vote for school committees.

ORDERED TO HAYTI.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 11.—Orders were issued by the navy department to-day for the United States steamers Galena and Yantic to sail from New York to-morrow for Port au Prince, Hayti, to enforce the demand of this government for the release of the American steamer Haytien Republic. They will sail in company and be under command of Rear Admiral Duoe, who has been instructed to transfer his flag from the Richmond to the Galena. The special permission of the secretary of the navy, will be a passenger on the Galena. It is, therefore, expected that his vessel will be restored to him as soon as it gets in the possession of the naval officers. Secretary Whitney declined to talk about the Haytien trouble, on the ground that there was nothing to add to what has already appeared in the newspapers.

AN IMPORTANT MOVE.

HALIFAX, Dec. 11.—An important move in the practical settlement of a vital point in the fishery controversy, was made here on Saturday. The Gloucester schooner N. A. Barton, Capt. Campbell, arrived from the banks with a cargo of halibut, and under the treaty of 1818, Capt Campbell decided to land a part of his cargo here, enter it at the custom house and pay duty and tranship the balance to Boston. He landed 8,000 pounds of packed fish on the public wharf, right under the noses of customs officers; delivered it to Phelan & Son, agents for the Boston, Halifax & Prince Edward steamship line, who shipped it for Boston. Consul-general Phelan frankly admitted that transshipment had taken place, and said fact showed for itself that shipment was not made under modus vivendi, but under rights claimed by the United States under binding arrangements of treaty at Washington. It is known that the consul-general has been in constant telegraphic communication with secretary Bayard. Dominion officials know all about transshipment, and the fact that they have not interfered is taken as evidence that transshipment is made with the approval of the Canadian government, and will be taken as an abandonment of Canadians.

HEAVY STORM RAGING.

ASHBURG PARK, N. Y., Dec. 11.—A heavy storm is raging and wind blowing on shore. Crews of the life-saving station are patrolling the beach. It is thought considerable damage was done at high tide this afternoon. A large quantity of coconuts came to shore, supposed to be from the wreck of some vessel.

EXTREMELY CROOKED.

CHICAGO, Dec. 11.—It is said that the interstate commission have never before unearthed as much crookedness as is revealed by the present investigation. It appears that all the roads have been employing scalpers to sell their through tickets below regular rates, thus permitting roads to quote a high proportion for short distances. The commissioners have decided that this must be stopped. It is said that they will render a decision that roads which cut rates through scalpers are guilty of violation of law. Managers of roads will be brought before the commission.

THE SETTERLIND-MASTEN CASE.

The preliminary examination of Willie Masten for killing John Setterlind at Skamokawa last Friday, was held at Cathlamet on Monday. Masten had awaited at Cathlamet the return of sheriff Albert from Gray's river, and gave himself into the sheriff's custody on his return.

Hon. J. F. Caples appeared as counsel for the accused, while the territory for the prosecution was unrepresented. The evidence of several witnesses examined and written correspondence was produced to prove that Setterlind had been guilty of improper intimacy with Mrs. Masten for a long time. Willie Masten testified in his own behalf that the knowledge of his mother's disgrace had so operated upon his mind as to cause him to do the fatal deed under a temporary loss of self control. He was held to appear before the district court at Kalama, next April. Public opinion in the neighborhood seems to be favorable to Masten, although all the parties to the terrible tragedy were well thought of before the damaging revelations were brought out.

It is stated that the will which Jno. Setterlind first made bequeathed his property, in case of his death, to Mrs. Masten, with the provision that at her death the property should be divided between her children. It is stated also, that after being shot and while he was on his way to this city, he requested that his will be altered so that at Mrs. Masten's death the property should then fall to her youngest child.

COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

The city council met in regular session last evening, Mayor Page in the chair, Councilmen Bergman, Cleveland, Robb and Welch present. In attendance auditor and police judge Jewett, city attorney Noland and chief of police Barry.

Minutes of last meeting were read and approved.

A petition of George Fisher, to allow him to set a post, with a light on it, at edge of sidewalk in front of his place of business, was allowed.

The committee to whom was referred the matter of taking measures to prevent disturbance of the public peace and injury to property at the Salvation Army barracks, reported that they had appointed a special policeman on the premises at the expense of the Army, and had put such regulations in force that there had been no disturbance on the premises complained of for the past two weeks; report adopted.

The report of the committee recommending that \$50 be appropriated to purchase the crossing at West 5th and Wall streets was adopted.

The committee on petition to have an electric light located at the crossing of Chenamus and Madison streets, reported that the light had been placed to the satisfaction of petitioners; report adopted.

Reports of auditor and police judge and street superintendent were referred to committee. An ordinance declaring the probable cost of improving Cedar street from west side of West 6th street to east side of Salmon street, was read first and second times, read third time under suspension of the rules, and passed. The following claims were ordered paid: Stockton & Olsen, \$15; M. C. Crosby, \$4; F. Sherman, \$1.75; sundry persons, \$140.40; M. C. Crosby, \$5.75; Sunset Telephone Co., \$3; Surprenant & Ferguson, \$8; J. G. Ross, \$32.94.

At the suggestion of mayor Page, that parties furnishing service or material under contract were subjected to unnecessary delay and inconvenience, by reason of their bills being referred to committee, a resolution was offered and unanimously adopted, that such bills, properly certified should be ordered paid without delay. Councilman Cleveland offered a resolution instructing the city attorney to draft an ordinance fixing the license of itinerant merchants at \$20 per day; adopted.

The dangerous state of the street and sidewalk at the north side of the custom house block, and the steps leading to the sidewalk were discussed, and the street committee recommended to take immediate steps to have the steps improved and vicinity properly lighted, in the manner they should decide best. Council adjourned.
