YESTERDAY'S ELECTION.

The day opened wet and stormy yesterday morning and continued so throughout. A great degree of interest was manifested in the election by the friends of the candidates, and no effort was spared to bring out as full a vote as the weather would permit. Perfect good nature prevailed on both sides during the day, although there was much earnest opposition, and some ventilation of alleged personal history. The result of the election became apparent long before the polls closed, as interested friends of the candidates kept a close and tolerably correct tally of the votes cast. The work of counting the votes was soon finished, and the result was as follows:

FIRST WARD.

Fox	288
Weeks	120
Fox's majority	168
Total number of votes cast in this ward	408

SECOND WARD.

Elton	154
Bowley	124
Elton's majority	30

In this ward there were 278 votes cast for Bowley and Elton, and one scattering for Fox.

The result is that Mr. Fox will fill the vacancy caused by the expiration of Councilman Sherman's term, and Mr. Elton will fill the place made vacant by Councilman Carruther's resignation.

The politics of the different candidates seemed to make the election a matter of interest to a good many, and so far as that is concerned, honors are easy at present as the council will stand evenly divided—three Republicans and three Democrats.

At the city election held a year ago on the 15th of this month, Bergman, received 330 and Trullinger 295 votes in the first ward, a total of 625, which is 175 votes more than were cast for councilman in the first ward yesterday. In the second ward last year, Welch received 207 votes and Stokes 141, a total of 348, which is 70 votes more than were cast yesterday.

Fox's majority of 138 yesterday is a larger majority than was received by any candidate on the city ticket last year, with the exception of harbor master, who got the combined vote of both wards: Snow 643, McCabe 320; a majority of 323 for Snow. At that time McCabe was out of town and was not able to make a personal canvass, which probably accounts for Snow's phenomenal majority. Last year the total vote for street superintendent was 970, which was the largest total vote cast for any one office and which is 254 more than the total number cast yesterday.

The difference may be accounted for by the fact that last year's election day was as fine weather as could be wished, while yesterday voters almost had to swim to the polls. And it was believed there were some few illegal votes cast last year, whereas yesterday probably there were none.

The elected candidates were the recipients of condolences from their friends last evening, while congratulations were tendered the defeated ones.

Captain Hustler's brass cannon was brought out and made mingle its thunder tones with the whish of rockets, celebrating the result of the election in the first ward.

It is probable that the result of the election has given as much general satisfaction as it would had the result been different.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Presidential Nominations—Soldiers Drowned.

River and Harbor Bill as Finally Agreed Upon.

WATERTOWN, N. Y., Dec. 12.—Sergeant Darlington, privates Fred Pettit and Benjamin Wilson, of Company "A," Eleventh infantry, located at Madison barracks, Sacket's harbor, were drowned in Lake Ontario. The boat in which they were fishing upset.

PRESIDENTIAL NOMINATIONS.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—This afternoon the president sent the following nominations to the senate: O. B. Eakem, of Kentucky, to be deputy first auditor of the treasury, vice E. P. Baldwin resigned; Walter I. Bragg, of Alabama, to be interstate commerce commissioner; also a large number of army and navy promotions, and of recess appointments of postmasters.

PARNELL COMMISSION.

LONDON, Dec. 12.—Before the Parnell commission this morning an attempt to introduce testimony from county Wexford to show intimidation, led to objection by Parnell's counsel, on the ground that Wexford was not included in the opening address. The presiding justice appealed to counsel for the *Times* to curtail the testimony as much as possible. The court was alarmed at the latitude which counsel were taking.

THE RIVER AND HARBOR BILL.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—The river and harbor appropriation bill was reported to the house this morning. Some changes were made in the bill. As finally agreed upon it appropriates \$11,906,850. The following are some of the items:

Humboldt county, Cal., \$47,000.

Oakland, Cal., \$16,650.

Coos bay, Oregon, \$80,000.

Yaquina bay, Oregon, \$100,000.

The canal at the Cascades, Oregon, \$150,000.

Month of Columbia river, Oregon, \$250,000.

Lower Willamette and Columbia rivers, \$60,000.

FEDERATION OF LABOR.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Dec. 12.—The American federation of labor resumed its session this morning. President Gompers appointed a special committee to report on the eight hour section of his annual address. In it he suggested the formation of an eight hour organization in all cities and towns, to concert a movement, and that on Friday, February 22d next, mass meetings to discuss the subject be held all over the country. A recess was then taken until this afternoon.

ILWACO ITEMS.

ILWACO, Dec. 12, 1888.

Probably last evening was one of the most tempestuous, the wettest, and most uncomfortable to be out doors in, yet all of Ilwaco's society braved the storm to be present at the wedding of Mr. Emerson Heath and Miss Ada Kofod, which was consummated at the church at 7 p. m. Judge C. C. Dalton used the Episcopal service, which he conducted in an impressive manner. Walter Seaborg acted as best groomsmen, Miss Addie Patton as first bridesmaid, Mr. Otto Hall and Miss Bertha Graham assisting. The bride was prettily arrayed in a low-necked dress, color of ashes of roses, white bridal veil, pearl necklace and looked charming. Both of the contracting parties are very popular and deserve the hearty congratulations they received. Although the church is several years old, this is the first wedding that has occurred within its sacred walls. Generally our people go to Astoria or Oysterville when they wish to be married.

A society, known as the Ilwaco gun club, was formed last week, and now comprises nearly forty members.
