CANADA-ALASKA LINE.

Work on the Survey About to be Commenced.

Congress at its last session appropriated \$100,000 as the amount to be expended to determine the boundary line between Alaska and Canada. Messrs. McGrath and Turner, of the United States coast survey, are engaged on preparatory work of the survey. These two gentlemen will work on the Porcupine river a branch of the great Yukon, and determine the 141 degree meridian, along which the boundary line passes. At the present time it has not been settled if any parties will proceed to Demarcation point, on the shores of the Arctic, but it is possible that some work will be inaugurated north of the Porcupine river, in order to determine the nature of the country, its features and resources. Messrs. McGrath and Turner will leave Puget sound in May next, and expect to be engaged for two seasons in the far north. Other parties will work north from southeastern Alaska to the Yukon, and it is expected that in 1890 the commissioners of both the United States and Canada will be able to definitely settle the territorial rights of their countries.

A Suggestion For the Girls.

Young women who aspire to a pleasant, responsible, congenial position in some comfortable business office, where their services as stenographers and typewriters shall bring quid pro quo in merited cash, must cultivate other things beside proficiency in shorthand hieroglyphics and the keyboard of the typewriter. The other day the fair applicant for an excellent position in the city was put through a preliminary test. Her fingers were skilled and her appearance and manner all that could be desired. But her brain and tongue were not up to the requirements, and her speech lacked the subtle something which her position called for. She said "unexperienced," and she wrote "would have" "would of." That settled the ambitious damsel, in so far as that office was concerned.

Washington's Representation.

If the fiftieth congress should see fit to admit Washington as a state during this session the people would be able to hold their constitutional convention, frame their constitution and elect two senators and a representative to the fifty-first congress which meets in December of 1889. Our present population would entitle us to one member of congress, but fortunately our admission will occur just before the taking of the eleventh census, in which enumeration it will probably be found that Washington is entitled to two representatives in the lower house. The house is now composed of 325 members and there is no likelihood of this number being increased. The apportionment at present is one representative to every 153,000 inhabitants. This apportionment was based on a total population in the United States of about fifty millions. Our population in 1890 will certainly amount to, if not exceed, sixty millions, by which estimate a representative in congress will be allowed to every 180,000 inhabitants. Washington territory today contains at least 200,000 people, and by the time the census is taken in 1890 will probably have 300,000 people. Judging by the present rate of immigration, this is a low estimate, so it is only reasonable to hope that by the new apportionment Washington will be represented at the national capital by two senators and two members of the house of representatives.—Post-Intelligencer.

Articles of incorporation of the "association of united miners and mine laborers of Washington territory" at Olympia, W. T., have been filed with secretary Owings. Its objects are to elevate the standard of labor among working men; the cultivation of amicable relations between capital and labor; the establishment of the principal of arbitration in all disputed cases; the protection of members when unjustly dealt with by employers, and the betterment of the condition of laboring men. It proposes to establish subordinate branches throughout the territory, subject to the control of this, the "Grand Society," which shall be located at Newcastle, W. T. Its officers for the first year are: John L. Hughes, president; Howell T. Jones, vice-president; John T. Varty, secretary; N. Hoffman, treasurer; John Dobson, Peter Gallagher, Thomas Nailor, J. Evans and Stephen Vaughn, executive board.
