A Case to Be Decided.

The United States supreme court will decide the celebrated narrow gauge case on Monday, January 7. Scott, the receiver of the road, stated that the extension from Sheridan to Nestucca would be made before ramifying in any other direction. If his observation is correct and the road extended in that direction, there will be a magnificent country opened for development. TELEGRAPHIC REPORT.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 5.—An attempt was made to rob a railroad ticket office here this morning. The robber appeared at the narrow window and ordered night operator Van Anker to throw up his hands. Van Anker immediately fired at the robber and the shot was returned, but neither took effect. Van Anker fired again and it is believed he struck the robber, though the robber escaped with two men who were with him. Ten suspicious characters were arrested this morning.

BADLY MIXED.

MONTREAL, Jan. 5.—A man named Charest went to California eighteen years ago to seek his fortune. After some time news reached his wife that he was dead. She was married again to the second husband, who was killed by an accident. She then married a third husband. A short time since her first husband appeared on the scene with thirty thousand dollars. He wished to live with his wife but she declined. The case is likely to come before the courts.

A COMPROMISE EFFECTED.

CHICAGO, Jan. 5.—Chief engineer P. M. Arthur, of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, arrived this morning from Cleveland. He was escorted with the members of the conference committee and the terms of settlement were formally presented to him. The terms of the truce have not been made public. It is considered probable that the chief points agreed upon are that the B. & Q. road shall take the Brotherhood men back as fast as vacancies occur in the ranks and that the black list shall be done away with.

The Pacific Coast Steamship Company.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 4.—Rumors were rife on the streets to-day that the agency of the Pacific Coast Steamship company had passed out of the hands of Goodall, Perkins & Co. Added to this it was asserted that John L. Howard, of the Oregon Improvement company, had taken the agency, and that the two companies would henceforth run rival lines to San Diego and the south, as well as to Victoria, B. C., and other points north of this city.

Some erroneous impressions have been afloat relative to the ownership of a number of steamers run by Goodall, Perkins & Co. The Pacific Coast Steamship company has been credited with the ownership of about twelve steamers, and was said to charter the *Mexico*, *Corona*, *Pomona*, *Pueblo*, and *Santa Maria* from the owners. It is said that the Oregon Improvement company was to run its twelve steamers, and Goodall, Perkins & Co., the five steamers named.

Captain Charles Goodall was seen at his office to-day, and admitted that a change in the agency of the Pacific Coast Steamship company is probable in the near future, as the contract made by Henry Villard with Goodall, Perkins & Co., some years ago will soon expire. From what Goodall said, it seems that Villard is anxious to have the company once more under his control. Goodall said that statements relative to the running of an opposition line of steamers by his firm are unfounded, and that the steamers all belong to the Oregon Improvement company, including those named, Goodall, Perkins & Co., being only agents.

The change in the agency, if effected, and it seems very likely it will be, is sure to create a stir in commercial circles.
