THE practice of commemorating the anniversary of deaths by an advertisement in the newspapers is growing very fashionable in England. A notice appeared in a Liverpool paper the other day reminding the world of the death of a four-months-old child who became an angel thirty-six years ago. This seems like carrying things to extremes.

THE abolition of slavery in Brazil is said to have had a deplorable effect upon the industries of the empire, and a financial crash is anticipated. The wants of the freedmen being few, they will not work steadily. Habits of industry and thrift are yet to be acquired. The financial outlook is so unfavorable that bank shares and similar securities have suffered a decline of 30 to 50 per cent.

IN the northern and western cities thousands of women hold the position of cashiers and other places of trust, but not one of them has ever been known to pocket a lot of money and skip to Canada. Year after year men steal and run across the border and the explanation is made that they could not live on their salaries, or that they have been unfortunate in speculation. But the women who receive hardly any salaries at all, manage to exist and behave themselves and take care of their employers' interests.

A WOMAN of Georgia who was deeply in earnest on the marriage question proposed to a young farmer whom she knew well to bet on the election. She wanted to bet herself against himself that Harrison would be elected. The farmer said he didn't want a wife, but as she importuned him, he finally said: "Well, I'll take the bet, because Cleveland is sure to be elected, and I won't take you till I get ready." "All right," said she, "and if Harrison is elected you've got to marry me on inauguration day or give me your farm." The fellow agreed to this, but since the election of Harrison he has shown a decided inclination not to live up to the agreement. He has turned his farm over to a creditor and gone to Texas. The woman says that she will follow him and make him pay the bet.

THE business men of Corvallis, Albany and Astoria are projecting railroads to build up their respective towns. But since Wm. SALEM, Jan. 9.—Preliminary steps were taken to-day for the organization of the Salem, Tillamook & Astoria Railway company. John G. Wright, president, and L. A. Manning, secretary of the Salem board of trade, W. F. Boothby, B. S. Cook and J. W. Maxwell, representative from Tillamook, were named as incorporators. The capital stock is \$100,000. It is the same distance from Tillamook to Stayton, by way of Salem, as from Tillamook to Albany. The meeting was attended by the most influential citizens of Salem and surrounding country. Great enthusiasm and determination prevail.

HEALTH OFFICER'S REPORT.

Health officer Estes has sent his quarterly report and a synopsis of the year's business to Gov. Penneyer. In the report Dr. Estes says: "Since the first of January, 1888, I have boarded, or had a deputy to board in my absence, to board 356 vessels, 171 sailing vessels and 185 steamers. I have required a bill of health from all ports where there has existed any contagion. There has not one case of contagious disease of any kind shown itself on arrival or departure from this port. I have taken it upon myself to employ a boatman during my two years' service for which I have paid out of my own pocket one dollar for each sailing vessel entering this port. Although the law does not require it of me, I have deemed it necessary for the protection of the health of the state. I hope that the coming legislature will see the importance of appointing or making provision for a boat puller for the health officer. All contagion this year, so far as I can learn, has come into the state through the railroads."
