INDIGNANT FISHERMEN.

Arrested for Technical Law Breaking.

The fishermen of the Russian river region are very indignant over the manner in which they have been treated for catching dog salmon and kindred fish. Several Americans have recently engaged in this business, after endeavoring to ascertain what was the law in the matter, and having found that a local court had decided that the fishery law did not include these fish as salmon. The most of the fishermen had just got their nets and boats ready for work, and in two instances had put them in for the first time, when, without warning, a boat with four officers of the law, armed with a Winchester and four pistols, swooped down upon the river at midnight, and at the point of the rifle all the men they could find were ordered into their boats and taken immediately to Guerneville, twelve miles distant, in the oil-cloth suits and rubber boots they had on, and although three of the fishermen passed within call of the houses where their families were awaiting their return they were not allowed to stop for a change of clothes or to call to them to tell them where they were going; and after searching the river for them it was not until noon the next day that they heard of their arrest. Ten of them have been fined from \$50 to \$100, and one sent to jail for fifty days. It seems, beside, that the chief of the fish patrol told the fishermen that it was not illegal to stake one end of the net to the bank, if the other were allowed to swing free, yet warrants were issued for their arrest.

A correspondent writing from Duncann's Mills, says: "Seals and sealions are very numerous about the mouth of the river, and daily devour more salmon than all the fishermen catch, yet they are protected by law, while the fishermen are sent to jail. Moral: It is better to be a seal than a man."

"Mulletts (suckers) abound in the river by millions, and their principal food is the spawn of fish, and where salmon are found on the riffles depositing their spawn these suckers are hovering around in schools devouring them; and yet it is a misdemeanor to draw them from the river and leave them to die on the shore, though they are not a marketable fish. Moral: It is a good thing for a man to be a sucker."—S. F. Chronicle.

COAST FISHERIES.

It is generally supposed that our near neighbors, the British Columbians, are very slow people who will never amount to very much until they join the great American procession. This is not entirely the case. They manifest much enterprise, and are developing their fine natural resources with great success. The fishing interest is one of their principal industries. They expected to pack 200,000 cases of salmon in 1888, but had bad luck, and only scored 76,000 cases. This is the second season of failure. They hope, however, to do better this year. One thing they did do in 1888, which is very important. They developed a new industry, and are now taking black cod and halibut from deep water. The business promises to expand to very large proportions. Much capital is invested in salmon packing. On Fraser river the investments are—in buildings, \$276,000; in boats and vessels, \$53,000; in nets, 70,000. In the northern canneries about \$400,000 is invested. On Fraser river 508 boats are employed, and 255 at the other canneries. All the canneries of the province employ 1,745 shoremen and 2,513 fishermen. The value of the total fishing product for 1888 is estimated as follows:

Canned salmon.....	\$1,081,747.44
Salt salmon.....	41,536.00
Fresh salmon.....	187,500.00
Other fish.....	36,000.00
Dog fish oil.....	27,000.00
Grand total.....	\$1,373,879.44

In addition twenty vessels are employed off the coast of British Columbia, and in Behring sea, hunting seals. The doubt as to whether British vessels can legally fish in the sea, has had a depressing effect, but the season's business amounts to 24,111 skins, valued at \$241,110. The capital invested in these vessels and outfit amounts to \$125,000, and 400 men are employed.—Ledger.
