FORTY-TWO DROWNED.

Arrest of a Suspect in Tunis, Africa.

Gossip About Blaine and the Cabinet.

SINGAPORE, Jan. 15.—The steamer *Phuapet* was sunk in a collision today and forty two persons drowned.

ARRESTED IN AFRICA.

TUNIS, Jan. 15.—The police have captured a gang of robbers and assassins. Among the members is a man believed to be the Whitechapel butcher of London. The British consul has forwarded all the details connected with the arrest of the supposed Whitechapel murderer, who is charged with having committed in Tunis a murder similar to those committed in Whitechapel. The man has confessed that he recently lived in Whitechapel.

A NEW YORK HOLOCAUST.

NEW YORK, Jan. 15.—The cigar box factory on East Fifth street is burning. Three girls are known to be burned to death. A man has been arrested on suspicion of having set the fire. Five girls were at work upon the upper floor, two were carried down on ladders by firemen. The other three who lost their lives were Josephine Farenkopf, Lena Straub and Barbara Appel. They were suffocated by smoke. The bodies were not badly burned. Loss \$50,000.

NO POLICE AUTHORITY.

CHICAGO, Jan. 15.—In the matter of application for an injunction by the anarchistic arbuter band to restrain the police from interfering with their meetings, Judge Talley decided that the police had no authority to prevent their meeting because they assumed that such meeting might violate the law. Judge Talley did not issue an injunction because he said that the police would not hereafter interfere.

FIRE AT SANTA MONICA.

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 15.—A telephone message from Santa Monica stated that the Santa Monica hotel burned to the ground early this evening. No particulars received.

LATER.—The hotel which was destroyed by fire at Santa Monica was at old Santa Monica and not New Arendia. The building was owned by Senator Jones of Nevada and Mrs. Clara E. S. Baker. The loss on the building is \$35,000, and on furniture, \$16,000 or \$17,000. The losses are well covered by insurance.

ALLEGED PROBABILITIES.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 15.—Nothing has come from Indianapolis of Gen. Harrison's intention regarding Mr. Blaine, and the fact annoys the friends of Mr. Blaine, if it does not him. To-day one of the warmest of Mr. Blaine's friends, who, it was thought, knew much of what is to be done in the matter, went privately to a disinterested party who is on friendly terms with Mr. Harrison, and asked if he had got any sort of intimation and what he thought the president elect would do as to Blaine. The question was asked with an anxiety that showed how much in doubt the question was. Renewed efforts are being made by the anti-Blaine men to prevent his selection. Within the past two or three days the anti-Blaine side of the question has been vigorously presented, but Mr. Blaine's enemies, as far as can be learned, have been no more successful than his friends in getting any expression of purpose or opinion from Gen. Harrison. One member said to-day that he knew the president elect wanted to make Sherman secretary of state, but that the attitude of the Ohio senator in the matter and the pressure being made by Blaine's friends would most likely result in Blaine's selection.

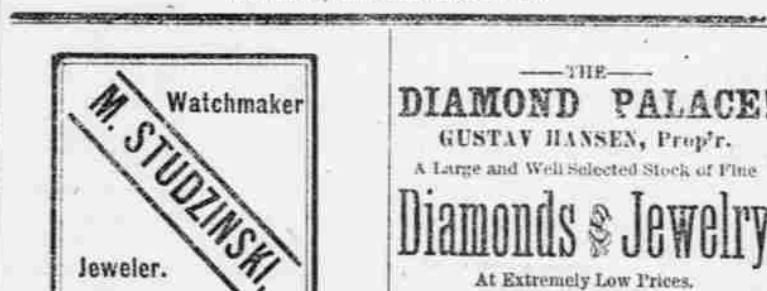
