### IN THE SENATE.

SALEM, Jan. 17.—The senate was in session less than half an hour this morning. After prayer by Rev. Mr. Rawlins, Steel offered a concurrent resolution to adjourn until 2 p. m. Monday. Then Irvine moved to adjourn at 10:30 o'clock. Several senators left the chamber before adjournment to catch the south bound train.

Coggswell offered a resolution directing chairman of all senate committees to employ Union veterans as clerks when possible. Chandler opposed the resolution. He said the state of Oregon owes the soldiers nothing, and if anything is due them it is from the government of the United States, which they served. He said there were a great many needy ladies looking for clerkships, and some of them, he thought, were more deserving than the soldiers.  
Coggswell explained that he introduced the resolution because two soldiers had spoken to him, explained that they were unable to find employment.  
The resolution passed, Chandler voting no.

Chandler—Moved to take from the table H. J. R. No. 12, giving the committees appointed to investigate the books of the secretary, secretary of state and fish commission power to summon witnesses; the motion carried and the senate adjourned.

### BILLS—FIRST READING.

By Moore—To incorporate the city of St. Helens, Columbia county, Oregon.  
By Steel—Authorizing persons employed by the United States survey to enter lands and make surveys, establish stations and reimburse the owner of the land if any damage has been done, and providing a forfeit of \$50 if any person removes any monument established by the surveyors.  
By Chandler—To repeal sections 10 and 11 of the stock law. These sections refer to the sale and delivery of stock.  
By Dimick—To defray the funeral expenses of Indian war veterans of Oregon and Union veterans of the rebellion and the Mexican war.  
By Wager—Re-establishing the boundaries of Weston.

### RESOLUTIONS.

By Tongue—Instructing the ways and means committee to ascertain if captain John Mullan is now acting as attorney for the state at Washington; if so, on what ground; if by contract, by whom was it made and what were the terms.  
By Watkins—Authorizing judges of circuit courts to direct the drawing of additional panels of twenty-four jurors from which trial jurors shall be selected.  
By Fullerton—Providing for the holding of court in the Second judicial district, as follows: Benton county, second Monday in March, fourth Monday in June, second Monday in November; Douglas county, fourth Monday in March, second Monday in July and first Monday in December; Lane county, fourth Monday in February, second Monday in June, fourth Monday in October; Coos county, first Monday in May and October; Curry county, third Monday in May.

### IN THE HOUSE.

SALEM, Jan. 17.—The house assembled at 10 A. M., and prayer was offered by Rev. P. H. Burnett of Salem. Apperson moved to dispense with the reading of the journal, but the motion was lost and the next half hour was spent in listening to the official report of the proceedings of yesterday.

Senate resolution that when the two houses adjourn to-day it be until 2 P. M. Monday, January 21, was concurred in.  
Senator Dimick's memorial to congress regarding the pay of Union soldiers was also concurred in.  
Blundell introduced a resolution regarding the change in school text books similar to the one introduced in the senate by Tongue; adopted.  
Miller of Jackson introduced a joint resolution providing for a committee to prepare joint rules for the government of the house and senate; adopted. The speaker appointed at such committees on the part of the house, Miller of Jackson, Northup and Condon.  
He also announced on the part of the house the following members of joint committees:  
To examine and report on the condition of the deaf and mute school—Stafford, Thompson and Myers.  
To examine and report on the condition of the state university—Ladd, Roe and Morelock.

### BILLS—FIRST READING.

By Hume—Providing for the purchase of artillery for Battery A, Oregon National Guard.  
By Paquet—To amend the law relating to the conveyances of real property, providing that the acknowledgment of a married woman shall be taken in the same manner as that of her husband.  
By Harrington—Amending the incorporation laws.  
By Apperson—Defining the causes for which divorces may be granted.  
By Gilbert—Relating to the distribution of the property of deceased persons.  
By Geer—Prohibiting the payment of labor in goods.  
By Geer—To provide for the collection of school tax.  
By Short—Repealing the whole specific contract law.  
By Geer—Repealing the law protecting Mongolian pheasants. Adjourned until 2 P. M. Monday.
