The secretary of the interior has given the O. R. & N. Co. permission to cross the Coeur d'Alene reservation, and one thousand men will be at work next week.

The new tariff bill which passed the senate by the close vote of 32 to 30, last Tuesday, puts the tariff on tin plate 70 per cent. It is and has been 33. Whew!

The members of the legislature of Minnesota have unanimously voted to return the passes sent them by the various railroad companies. There are other legislatures in session the members of which ought to follow their example.

A new British Columbia road is the Vancouver & Fraser Valley. It is projected to run from Nooksack, W. T., northwest into British Columbia, passing through Langburg, Surrey, the Delta and Richmond, and crossing the Fraser river a short distance below Ladner's landing.

The Seattle, Lake Shore and Eastern road is now built sixty miles east from Seattle and forty miles west from Spokane Falls. A stop has been made for more funds. It is expected that with the backing of the O. R. & N. Co., the Seattle road will be enabled to go ahead and complete a transcontinental line through some pass of the Cascade mountains.

The Edmunds resolution differs from the Monroe declaration of 1823 to the extent of being more positive and aggressive. In the former instance there was merely a sort of general protest against possible European interference with any American nationality, whereas in the present case a certain contemplated proceeding is objected to in a form which implies a purpose of direct resistance, if such a step shall become necessary, to prevent the consummation of the scheme.

In The Senate and House.

SENATE.

SALEM, Jan. 23.—Rev. Mr. Brown, of Salem, prayed at the opening of the morning session of the senate.

RESOLUTIONS.

By Wager—Appointing G. M. Smith assistant doorkeeper of the senate; referred to the committee on military affairs.

By Fullerton—Requesting the state superintendent of public instruction to furnish the senate the names of the county superintendents who voted for the recent changes in text books; adopted.

BILLS—FIRST READING.

By Veatch—To authorize the assessment and collection of road taxes and the election of road supervisors and prescribing their duties.

By Cuthbert—To appropriate money and to purchase land to aid the state Agricultural college, and to defray the expenses of the current litigation with the Methodist church south.

By Dawson—To amend the act creating the state board of railroad commissioners.

By Gray—Instructing the secretary of state to credit Clatsop county with \$3,600 now on the books as delinquent taxes.

By Looney—To prevent the adulteration of food, drugs and drink.

By Barin—To authorize the collection of road taxes and the election of road supervisors.

By Fullerton—To appoint the time and place of holding the supreme court.

By Cogswell—Appropriating money for the relief of Lake county.

By Dawson—Making it the duty of sheriffs to make financial statements with county treasurers every thirty days.

By Chandler—To adjust and relocate the boundary line between Union and Baker counties, and to attach a portion of Union county to Baker.

By Wager—To more fully secure the independence of electors and the secrecy of the ballot.

By Fullerton—To authorize the state treasurer to pay to Douglas county money known as the North Umpqua bridge fund.

By Gray—Providing for the appointment of a boatman at Astoria, at a salary of \$500 a year.

By Mackay—Allowing county courts to raise a road fund by levying an annual tax not to exceed 5 mills on the dollar.

By Tongue—Authorizing district attorney to appoint a deputy at a salary of \$5 a day.

By Wait—To protect hotel keepers, inn keepers and boarding house keepers.

By Tongue—Making it a misdemeanor for any person to throw the carcass of an animal into a brook or stream.

By Hilton—To provide for the permanent location of the county seat of Gilliam county by special election.

By Mackay—To authorize the construction of a bridge across the Willamette river at Portland.

By Veatch—Making the legal rate of interest in Oregon 6 per cent. per annum.

By Dawson—Requiring civil suits to be brought in the county where the defendant may reside or may be found at the time of the institution of the suit.

By Fullerton—To amend the act incorporating the city of Roseburg.

By Cuthbert—To encourage tree planting in the public schools, and making the last Friday in April, Arbor day.

By Eakin—To authorize the operation and construction of the Siuslaw & Eastern railway.

By Fullerton—To change the mode of taxing costs.

By Cogswell—To quiet title to certain lands in the state.

By Norval—Redistricting the state into senatorial and representative districts.

By Veatch—To regulate the transportation of railroad freights.

By Dawson—To attach judgments.

By Cogswell—To create the county of Hamilton out of the northern part of Grant county.

By Dawson—Making it a misdemeanor for any one to have Mongolian pheasants in his possession between January 1 and July 15.

By Chandler—Providing for the killing of stock infected with disease.

By Fullerton—Fixing the bounty on scalps of wild animals.

By Looney—Making it a misdemeanor for any person to ask to be put on a jury, or for any sheriff or constable to put such a person on a jury.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

A bill was introduced by Barin, requiring suits in equity to be begun and tried in the county where the subject of the suit or some part thereof is situated.

BILLS SECOND READING.

By Watts—To authorize the construction of a bridge across the Willamette river between Marion and Yamhill counties; read the third time, and passed.

By Watts—Authorizing William Bull to construct a boom on the north Yamhill river; committee on corporations.

By Moore—Making it a misdemeanor for any person not to leave the premises of another when ordered to do so; judiciary committee.

By Moore—Making an illegitimate child the heir of its mother; judiciary committee.

By Hilton—Requiring inspectors of sheep to certify that the same are free from disease; committee on agriculture.

By Cogswell—To construct a wagon road from Paisley to the southern boundary of the state, near Klamath river; committee on commerce.

By Hilton—Making it unlawful for any person or corporation to herd stock near the grades of roads, so as to endanger the same by rolling stones; committee on roads and highways.

By Irvine—To protect contractors, sub-contractors and laborers in their claims against railroad companies, corporations or sub-contractors; corporations committee.

By Cogswell—To authorize C. S. and R. S. Moore to construct a boom on Link river; corporations committee.

By Hamilton—For the improvement of the wagon road from Heppner to Monument; committee on counties.

By Sinclair—To authorize Coos county to maintain certain bridges; committee on roads and highways.

ENGROSSED BILLS.

By Chandler—Repealing that portion of the act providing for the collection of taxes which refers to Baker county; referred to committee on counties, with instructions to amend, so that it will not be applicable to the present clerk.

COMMUNICATIONS.

From state superintendent of public instruction McElroy, submitting the list of county superintendents.

Fullerton called for the reading of a resolution requesting the superintendent to furnish the names of county superintendents who voted in favor of the recent change in text books. He then said the desired information had not been furnished, and the resolution was returned to Supt. McElroy.

MEMORIALS.

By Irvine—S. J. M. No. 5—Asking congress to pension the veterans of the Indian war between 1847-57 the same as Mexican veterans; ordered printed.

By Hilton—S. J. M. No. 6—Memorializing congress to declare forfeited the Northern Pacific land grant between Wallula and Portland; ordered printed.

Reports were read from several committees, recommending engrossing.

REPORTS.

From the judiciary committee—Recommending the passage of Dawson's bill making deeds signed by grantors legal; ordered engrossed.

From the judiciary committee—Recommending the passage of Tongue's bill relating to descent and distribution of real property of deceased persons; ordered engrossed.

From the same—Recommending the passage of Tongue's bill requiring a married woman who voluntarily makes a deed with her husband to acknowledge that it is made without compulsion; ordered engrossed.

From the election committee—Recommending the passage of Cogswell's bill requiring the secretary of state to make an abstract of votes; ordered engrossed.

From the committee on counties—Recommending that the bills of Eakin and Cogswell, providing for the holding of terms of the county court, be merged and passed; ordered engrossed.

From the military committee—That H. J. M. No. 3, petitioning congress to retire Sergeant Robert Williams, of Vancouver, on 75 per cent. pay, has been properly engrossed, and recommending its passage; placed on the calendar.

From the committee on commerce—Recommending the passage of Haley's bill providing for the building of a wagon road from Pendleton to Canyon City; engrossed.

From the agricultural committee—Recommending the passage of Dimick's bill to extirpate the Canada thistle; engrossed. Adjourned.

HOUSE BILLS ON SECOND READING.

Hunter's bill to provide for the improvement of Wallowa canyon wagon road; referred to the committee on commerce.

Earhart's bill to amend an act relating to the incorporation of the city of Portland authorizing the issuing of bonds to the amount of \$1,500,000 for the purpose of bringing Ball Run water into the city; referred to the Multnomah county delegation.

Strombridge's bill for the prevention of enticing or harboring seamen, and the prohibiting the payment of blood-money; referred to the committee on commerce.

Roe's bill to amend an act relating to the incorporation of the city of La Grande; referred to the committee on judiciary.

Pope's bill to regulate the practice of medicine.

Roberts' bill to establish the office of state examiner of stationary and portable engines; referred to the committee on internal improvements.

Ladd's bill to provide for a harbor master at the ports of Portland and Astoria; referred to the committee on commerce.

Northrup's bill to amend Hill's code relating to pilotage on the Columbia and Willamette rivers; referred to the committee on commerce.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The speaker announced the appointment of a special committee to consider the bill to regulate the practice of medicine and surgery in this state, consisting of Pope, Goodnough and Belknap.

G. M. Smith, of Umatilla county, was appointed assistant doorkeeper.

McCoy submitted a joint memorial asking congress to reduce the price of public lands between Umatilla and Portland to \$125 an acre; referred to committee on commerce.

A message was received from the senate announcing the passage of Watt's bill authorizing the construction of a bridge between Marion and Yamhill counties; read first time.

Greer's bill to repeal the act relating to vagrants, was referred to judiciary committee.

Hume's bill to amend the code relating to the punishment for stealing stock; ordered engrossed and passed to third reading.

Gilbert's bill to confer certain powers upon benevolent and charitable institutions; committee on judiciary.

Condon's bill to amend Hill's code, relative to taxing costs; committee on judiciary.

Bill of Miller, of Jackson, to amend Hill's code relating to the game laws; referred to committee on judiciary.

Layman's bill to regulate the sale of spirituous or malt liquors; committee on alcoholic traffic.

Jenning's bill to amend Hill's code relating to interest and usury; referred to committee on assessment and taxation.

Waldo's bill repealing the section of Hill's code which punishes the receiver of a bribe for his vote; referred to committee on elections.

Cook's bill to provide for the construction of a wagon road in Curry county; committee on ways and means.

Hume's bill to regulate the heating of steam passenger cars; committee on railways.

Price's bill to authorize the Tolo Milling company to construct a boom; committee on corporations.

Speaker Smith's bill to provide for constructing and operating a portage railway between The Dalles and Celilo, and the upper and lower Cascades; committee on commerce.

Earhart's bill to provide for the purchase and distribution of the fourteenth and fifteenth volumes of Oregon supreme court reports and laws of Oregon; considered engrossed and ordered to third reading.

Blundell's bill to establish a state weather service; committee on agriculture.

Harrington's bill to amend section 1548, chapter 34, title 1, of criminal procedure, Hill's code, defining magistrates; ordered engrossed and passed to third reading.

Harrington's bill to amend section 988, chapter 12, title 3, of Hill's code, relating to jurors; ordered engrossed and passed to third reading.

Moss's bill to incorporate the town of Lakeview; committee on corporations. Adjourned.
