All the electoral votes of the differ-
ent states of the Union had to be in
the hands of John J. Ingalls, presi-
dent of the senate at noon yesterday.
On the second Wednesday of next
month those votes will be counted
before both houses of congress.

lished. The *Oregonian* uniquely

the Columbia river.

ant was rearrested, charged with as-
sault and battery, plead guilty and
was fined \$5 and costs. W. J. Barry
plead guilty to assault upon O. W.
Danbar, and paid \$5 and costs.

Winfield Blakes, a colored stage
driver of Media, Pa., claims the belt
as the champion gourmand. Febru-
ary 22, on a bet of \$10, he will at-
tempt to eat in one hour half a peck
of turnips, half a peck of white pota-
toes, six cups of coffee, four loaves of
bread, half a pound of stewed prunes,
four pounds of beef, six small pies,
three spring chickens, three oyster
steaks, fifty raw oysters, one can of
sardines and wash all this down with a
pint of whiskey.

The editor of the *Montsalum Herald*
defends himself from a charge of
stealing items from a neighbor by
saying that, not only in the papers in
his immediate vicinity but in the big
dailies, he constantly finds his own
items without credit. He is right.
Small fugitive items can scarcely
ever be credited with safety, for there
are so many thieves in the business
that unless an item bears internal evi-

idence of originality a person taking
it is more likely to give credit to the
thief than to the author.
The London *Grocers' Gazette* says:
There is not much business to record
as yet. The *Pericles* has arrived with
3,000 cases, 2,500 being flat tins Co-
lumbia river pack, and the balance
Alaska fish. As we recently pointed
out, the shipments from Alaska will
be large, whereas the Columbia river
and British Columbia salmon will be
under 200,000 cases. The Alaska fish
is not likely to approach in quality
that from the old sources of supply,
and as far as we can gather from the
best informed authorities, it will have
to be dealt in as a distinctly lower
and cheaper grade.

Said For a Large Sum.
This afternoon Frank M. Warren
and P. M. Warren instituted a suit in
Judge Shattuck's court against Louis
Solomon to recover \$15,704.43.

The Warrens allege that on the 31st
of December, 1888, plaintiff and de-
fendant had an accounting to deter-
mine the mutual claims and demands
existing between them, when it was
found that the defendant was in ar-
rears to the plaintiffs in the sum of
\$30,672.20, which he agreed to pay.
At that time the Warrens held a
consignment of 995 cases of two-
pound salmon and 6,718 one-pound
cases to be sold for Solomon on a cer-
tain commission, and the proceeds of
the sale to be credited to the arrange-
ment. Sufficient salmon was disposed
of to reduce Solomon's indebtedness
to the Warrens to \$14,948.20.

For a separate cause of action the
Warrens claim \$756.23, which they
allege they paid to Ladd & Tilton at
Solomon's request.—*Portland Tele-
gram*, 26.

THE COMMON COUNCIL.
The Committees For the Ensuing Year.

The city council last evening heard
a petition from the Clatsop road and
construction company, asking the
council to take proper steps to ex-
tend Concomly street from its pre-
sent terminus to connect with the road
now built by the company. Council-
man Bergman moved that a commit-
tee be appointed from the council to
confer with Mr. Trullinger. Council-
man Bergman favored the idea, and
thought that such action as that
prayed for by the council was neces-
sary. Councilman Bergman's motion
prevailed. Mayor Page appointed
councilmen Bergman, Fox and Welch
as such committee.

A petition from Messrs. Strauss &
Selig, regarding disorderly conduct
at the theater during performances
and asking police protection, was re-
ferred to committee on health and
police—when appointed.

A petition from Mrs. J. T. Ross and
Miss M. E. Warren, numerously
signed, asking that boys under 15
years be prohibited from roaming the
streets after 8 o'clock P. M. in winter
and 9 P. M. in summer. The petition
was referred to the city attorney with
instructions to draw up an ordinance
in accordance with the petition, in
case there is no present ordinance
applying to the matter.

(There is such an ordinance now in
force. It is proper action on the part
of fathers and mothers that is more
needed than "ordinances" which at-
tempt to do what parents should do.)
Councilmen Welch, Fox and Elton
were appointed to aid the city attor-
ney in the preparation of an ordinance
on the matter.

Communications from collector W.
J. Barry, regarding an assessment of
\$229.60 on some property, and from
M. J. Kinney, relative to the same
matter, were, on motion, referred to
the city attorney, for a written opin-
ion thereon.

The special committee to whom
was referred the annual reports of
officers asked for further time, which
was granted.

An ordinance amending an ordi-
nance granting a franchise to the As-
toria Street Railway company, was
read first time.

An ordinance authorizing the may-
or to appoint certain standing com-
mittees, and defining their duties,
was read second and third time, and
passed by a unanimous vote. Mayor
Page immediately signed the ordi-
nance, and appointed the following
committees:

completed the Benton street sewer.
A special committee consisting of
councilmen Robb, Elton and Berg-
man, was appointed to report thereon.
Petition from Astoria Engine Co.,
No. 1, referred to committee on fire
and water.

Petition for light cor. Concomly
and Jackson sts., referred to com-
mittee on public property.
The auditor and police judge was
instructed to have rules of order and
list of standing committees printed.
Adjourned.

ITALY WANTS PEACE.
The Woman Suffragists Before Congress.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23.—The house
committee on judiciary held a special
meeting to-day, to hear addresses
from members of the woman's suffrage
association in support of an amend-
ment to the constitution of the
United States granting the elective
franchise to women. Among the
speakers were Susan B. Anthony,
Isabella Beecher Hooker, Rev. Olym-
pia Brown, Mrs. Clara B. Colby editor
of the *Woman's Tribune*, Mrs. A. S.
Daniway, of Oregon and others.

ITALIAN POLITICS.
ROME, Jan. 23.—Parliament was
opened to-day by King Humbert. In
his speech the king alluded to bills
which would be introduced by the
government as eminently pacific.
The visit of the emperor of Germany
had proved the depth of Germany's
attachment to Italy. In conclusion
the king said, "Italy will continue to
work for peace, which all desire, and
which I can declare will be kept by
us."

FIRE AT DULUTH.
DULUTH, Jan. 23.—Fire was dis-
covered in the grand opera house
shortly before two o'clock this morn-
ing. It was soon beyond control al-
though the whole fire department was
early on the spot. At 3:30 the build-
ing was a total loss. A row of frame
buildings next to the opera house
were in great danger, but all were
saved except the postoffice, which was
consumed. The total loss is \$200,000.

BISMARCK'S SPEECH.
BERLIN, Jan. 23.—While speaking
on the east Africa bill in reichstag
Saturday, Bismarck's voice was un-
usually weak, being almost inaudible
except to those near him, and gave
the impression that, as he was slight-
ly indisposed, his throat troubled him.
His reference to the co-operation of
England with Germany in east Africa
caused a good impression.

THE PANAMA CANAL.
PANAMA, Jan. 23.—Work has con-
tinued regularly on the canal except
the temporary stoppage at Culebra.
A few workmen have left the country.
De Normandie, the administrator of
the canal, has cabled from Paris con-
ferring the power to draw for 1,500,-
000 francs, and to continue. This
sum is added to \$300,000 previously
on hand. The work will therefore be
continued for some time, if no fur-
ther provision is made. On January
8th a second message was received
from De Normandie. Arrangements
have been made for continuation of
the work on the canal by a number of
contractors.

OPPOSITION TO THE FORD BILL.
NEW YORK, Jan. 23.—The trans-
Atlantic ship agents denounce the
bill introduced by congressman Ford
to restrict immigration. They con-
sider it simply outrageous beyond all
reason, and a bar to further immigra-
tion into this country. They write
that they unite in declaring that in
its present form it can never become
a law and that they will strenuously
oppose its passage.
