FARM AND GARDEN.

The Jersey Bulletin claims that
no other breed will produce as
much butter as the Jersey from
the same amount of food.

It is questionable economy to
provide small feeding boxes.
Some horses waste more feed than
others, and with good feeding
boxes much of this may be avoid-
ed.

Charcoal should be fed to hogs
and poultry. Experiment has
demonstrated that the same feed
will produce a far greater amount
of flesh and fat when fed with
plenty of charcoal.

Dr. Hoskins says: "We repeat
and shall keep repeating that corn
is the best and cheapest feeding
material that the American farmer
can grow—but only when he
knows how to use it rightly."

If a little clearing, a little ditch-
ing, a little enriching or a little
picking up is done each year the
farm will steadily improve. On
the other hand if the farm suffers
a little neglect it will soon run
down.

A recent meeting of Texas
wool growers adopted resolutions
petitioning congress to so amend
the tariff as to prevent the impor-
tation of foreign wool under the
names of ring waste, thread waste,
yarn waste, etc.

Endeavor to keep hens instead
of pullets, as the eggs will then be
uniform. But do not keep very
old hens. Never ship an egg
that is dirty or in any manner
spoiled. The appearance is a
prime factor in the sale of any
article.

Of the 45,000,000 or more cattle
in the United States, Texas is
estimated to have 4,724,053, the
value of which reaches the sum of
\$86,518,800. There are more
cattle in Texas than any other
state, but in value New York,
Illinois and Iowa lead.

Remember that gravel, broken
crockery, or some similar material
is essentially necessary to the
health of your fowls at all times.
If the soil does not contain a
natural supply or is frozen, this
grinding material must be sup-
plied or disease will come sooner
or later.

One hundred years ago apples
were not much larger than plums,
tomatoes were entirely unknown,
and many of the most valuable
fruits and vegetables grew in the
woods in the wild state in which
nature created them. Horticultu-
re has made wonderful strides,
and is advancing every day.

The agricultural professors tell
us that the raising of 30 bushels
of wheat to the acre will remove
from the land 51 pounds of nitro-
gen, 24 pounds phosphoric acid
and 37 pounds of potash. This
could be replaced by 60 pounds of
sulphate of ammonia, 171 pounds
of superphosphate of lime and 76
pounds chloride of potash.

The guinea fowl comes the near-
est to being self supporting of all
the kind of poultry in domestication.
It is a great forager, prefers
to roost out of doors, and will give
timely warning of any approach-
ing danger or unusual commotion.
They lay a large number of finely
flavored eggs, and as a table fowl
they are equal to the prairie
chicken.

Most every farmer is aware of
the fact that a sheep must be fat
to make the best mutton, but few
conceive the idea that a properly
and well fed sheep produces more
and better wool than one poorly
fed and cared for. Wool is a pro-
duct from feeding; just the same
as fat or flesh, and the flock should
be fed and managed with a view
to wool growth, and that of fine
quality.

If a calf is at all dainty about its
food, do not keep it for a cow.
No pedigree can offset the disad-
vantage of poor appetite and poor

great a variety of food as possible
is the best plan we know of to
make it a hearty eater. The
greater the variety, the more food
can be eaten, and this if continued
means increased digestive powers,
on which in any animal, man not
excepted, future usefulness must
depend.

ried a sewing machine from Grat-
ton to her home, a distance of
sixty miles.—Baltimore Ameri-
can.
