Next Monday President-elect Harrison will be inaugurated. He is the 23rd president. This is the centennial of American presidents, George Washington having been inaugurated April 30th, 1789. Soon the good old ship of state will again come rounding into port, not a stripe torn nor a star missing, as she fires her hundredth gun, one for each year. Steadily the stars have increased on our flag till now forty-two grace the galaxy, and the nation goes forward with leaps and bounds of progress.

Nearly fifty years ago president Wm. Henry Harrison went to Washington to be inaugurated; he went by wagon, stage and canal boat. This week his grandson has gone to Washington in a Pullman car on the same errand. When the grandfather went to the national capital to take the oath of office it was with the votes of 1,275,017 citizens. The grandson goes with the votes of 5,566,702. Then the country had a population of 17,000,000; now it has 67,000,000.

Considerable of a Raise.

The O. R. & N. Co. has issued a new schedule, largely increasing the passenger and freight rates between this city and Astoria, which will go into effect March 1.

The rate for passengers between Portland and Astoria, which has of late been 75 cents, and for the round trip \$1.10, will be \$2 each way, or \$3 for the round trip.

The rates of freight under the new schedule are as follows: Portland to St. John's, mouth of Willamette, St. Helens, 50 cents; Columbia City, 75 cents; Kalama, 81 cents; Bannock and Cedar Landing, \$1.10; Mount Coffin, \$1.25; Clifton, Knappa and intermediate points, \$1.50; Astoria, \$2. Rates between intermediate points are raised in the same proportion.

The old rates were as follows: Portland to St. John's, mouth of the Willamette, St. Helens, 25 cents; to Columbia City, Brookfield and intermediate points, 50 cents, and to Pillar Rock, Knappa and Astoria, 75 cents. —Oregonian, 28.

LIFE IN THE WHITE HOUSE.

Uncle Sam Does Not Provide For All of the President's Household Expenses.

Mrs. Harrison begins her experience in the White House next Monday. Perhaps some of our readers might like to know something of the experiences which she will have when she reaches Washington as the wife of the president. Will she pack simply her trunks with wearing apparel and move into a house completely furnished and filled with beds and bedding, silver tableware, servants and cooking utensils, or will all of these things have to be brought along or provided there? This is a question very often asked, and with it a good many others, as to horses and carriages, coachmen and waiting maids, cost of arid payment for the necessities of the kitchen, dining-room, etc. It is a curious fact that all the cabinet officers are furnished with horses, carriages and coachmen at the government expense. If the president wants any of these things he must supply them himself. There is a stable near the house built during Grant's time, with plenty of room for horses, but every president who comes finds it empty. And of course costs him lots of money to fill it. Whoever sells a horse or carriage to the president of the United States expects to get about 35 per cent. more for it than if he sold it elsewhere. Of course the president must have three carriages and several horses. Whether general Harrison will bring any with him is not known. Probably he will buy new carriages, and of course a president's horses must be thoroughbred. And he need not expect much of them after he gets through his term in the White House either, for Washington pavements are hard on horses, as president Cleveland's big seal-browns show. The president is also obliged to furnish his own driver. Albert Hawkins, a big colored man whom Grant brought here before he became president, is still driving at the White House, as he has done ever since Grant's term, and will probably be re-engaged by Mr. Harrison; but, if he does, it will be at his own expense, for the government does not pay Albert's salary.

Inside the White House Mrs. Harrison will find employees waiting to be re-engaged and paid for their services. The steward, who has charge of the kitchen and dining-room, the various subordinates who sweep, dust and cook and attend to the table-ware—they are all private employees. Down in the basement, if you pass at the proper time, you see the laundry work of the White house going on. All these employees, however, are paid privately. Of course, there is a yearly appropriation for the contingent expenses of the White house, but this is intended more to keep up the furniture and furnishings generally than to pay the cost of the president's living or the hire of his servants.

One thing that Mrs. Harrison will find is a completely furnished house—solid silver, the best china, linen for the table and bed chambers, elegant furnishings in the parlors and fairly good in the private parts of the house. The private dining-room is on the first floor, just across the hall from the state dining-room. This is the only room on the first floor used by the family of the president. The parlors are used by the callers, and the entire family or "living" rooms are on the second floor. There are, perhaps, a half dozen of these, scarcely more; a sitting-room or two near to the circular "library room," where the president sits during his working and business hours, and several handsomely furnished bed-rooms and dressing-rooms. An elevator carries the family down stairs at meal time, and when they go down for any other purpose, if they desire it; but as a rule they walk up and down the broad, easy and luxuriously carpeted stairs and through the handsome always attractive corridors which lead the way to the dining-rooms and parlors on the first floor. There they find everything ready, for the experienced steward is able to relieve the mistress of the White house of all the cares of house-keeping—if he is well paid for it.
