The San Francisco lumber market is dull: 40,000,000 feet of lumber, of all grades, are stored there.

A Dubuque, Iowa, man has just shipped 1,100 cats and 200 dogs to Dakota, where the animals are wanted to exterminate ground mice.

During February, 135 cars lumber and 47 cars shingles were shipped eastward from the Columbia and Willamette rivers. Of these, 88 cars lumber and 41 cars shingles went to Denver.

The California insurance companies have eaved the governor down the bank; he has vetoed a bill admitting the formation of a mutual insurance company and plainly shown his preference and prejudice for the compact.

CITY COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

At the city council proceedings last evening a petition from Fred Sherman, asking permission to place an apron on West 6th street, was referred to street committee with power to act. A communication from Chief Engineer Snyder, directing attention to the fact that the place of electrician is vacant and recommending that one be appointed, at a salary of at least \$10 per month; referred to committee on fire and water.

A remonstrance against the improvement of West 6th street was read, and there being two-thirds of the property represented, was filed.

W. H. Smith's communication, received at last meeting, was, on motion, laid on the table in accordance with the recommendation of the committee to whom the claim was referred.

The street committee reported street superintendent Clinton's report correct, and reported the street in front of Jas. McCann's residence in bad condition, and recommended its repair; report adopted.

The special committees on the extension of First street westward, and on the pipe line, asked for further time, which was granted.

The street superintendent and city auditor and clerk reported for February: the amount of fines and forfeitures for February in the police court was \$95.

An ordinance to amend ordinance 590 was referred to the committee on fire and water.

An ordinance providing for the time and manner of improving Second street westward from Main was passed under suspension of the rules.

An ordinance amending an ordinance granting a franchise to the Astoria Street Railway company, extending the time to fifty years, was read third time and passed.

An ordinance to provide for the licensing of barrooms, etc., was laid over to the next meeting.

The following claims were ordered paid: Wilson & Fisher, \$18.80; \$1.50; Carruthers & Co., \$1.50; \$7.50; Sundry persons, \$35.50; \$78.20; Astoria Iron Works, \$82; West Shore Mills, \$109.52; W. W. Bolcher, 50 cents; Sunset Telephone Company, \$3; Clatsop Mill Co., \$23.34; Astoria Gas-light Co., \$108.60; \$17.84; Electric Light Co., \$176; Geo. W. McBride, \$4.75; W. J. Barry, \$6.

Resolutions regarding the improvement of Benton and Third streets were adopted.

Resolutions regarding the improvement of Lafayette and Washington streets were also adopted.

Regarding the amount of \$225 city tax said to be due from M. J. Kinney, Chief Harry made verbal report; Mayor Page stated the facts in the case.

Councilman Welch called attention to the matter of paying \$5 a month for a dog house when a suitable dog house could be rented for \$2.50 a month, and moved that the council delegate him to report on the matter at the next meeting. The motion prevailed and the council adjourned.

From the City Near the Ocean Shore. ILWACO, March 11, 1889.

Our people can easily understand why it is that there has been a lack of eastern mail of late, but wherefore THE ASTORIAN should fail to arrive twice a week is both puzzling and disappointing.

The I. R. & N. Co. have a force of men at work under the direction of Captain Edward Spencer, ballasting and improving the track. Once again the locomotive whistle is heard screeching through the woods and warning cows and other traps to clear the track. Boats are arriving frequently with railroad material and lumber, and times are busy.

Every other householder in town owns a cow, and milk can be had for 10 cents a quart provided the buyer furnishes transportation, and yet we were obliged to submit to a bitter famine which lasted five days, and only by telegrams to Frisco and about, was relief finally obtained.

California cabbage and Oregon mutton and potatoes find ready sale here.

Handsome spiles, 30 feet and more in length, brought down from St. Helens way, are sold here for 85 cents each.

A man recently obtained permission to and did cut down twenty-five young hemlock trees in the woods near by. They are in the woods yet; owner wants 50 cents stumpage. Timber hereabouts is held at high figures, so high that it is allowed to remain growing.

Miss Lizzie Harris, niece of Capt. A. J. Harris is seriously ill at the Cape; reported to be a case of typhoid fever.

From present indications there will be more pound nets in Baker's bay this season than ever before.

Some claim that owing to warm spring weather there will be a very light run of salmon. The spring of '83 was just like the present one.

Material for building and a few carpenters are already down from Portland, bound for the weather beach.

Bro. Reed is still here preaching every night in the schoolhouse. This makes the sixth week he has labored to convince his hearers that Saturday is the true Sabbath, and of the near approach of the end of the world. And he has made several converts and friends.

The masquerade on the 4th inst. was the best ever held here, our people love to dance, and probably will pay their compliments to the memory of St. Patrick on the night of the 16th.

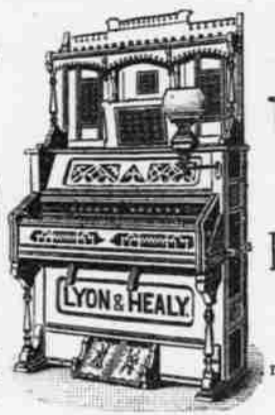

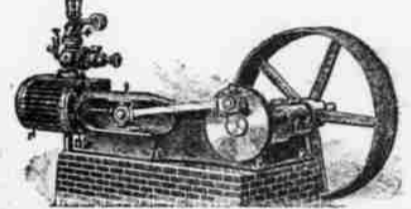
