A Brief Record of the Day's Doings.

Boulanger Flees From France to Belgium. PORTLAND, April 3.—Wm. Brown, who stabbed John Buckley in the abdomen, on the 17th of last March, was on trial to-day. The trouble arose over a Mrs. Snyder. When Snyder was placed on the witness stand he declined to answer questions in regard to the matter, and was sent to jail for ten days. Buckley, who also seemed inclined to shield Brown, did not recollect anything and the case was dismissed. The grand jury to-day indicted Lizzie Klein for stealing a gold watch and ring from her employer, Mrs. Wederkin; and Frank Janchett for the murder of Chas. J. Oisen, Feb. 23.

MISSOURI POLITICS. ST. LOUIS, April 3.—The city elections were held throughout Missouri yesterday, but as far as reported politics did not cut much of a figure. The Democrats elected a majority of the ticket in Jefferson City, Sedalia, Cape Girardeau, Mexico, and Springfield; the republicans were successful in Booneville, Maryville, Carthage, and St. Joseph, while the people's and other mixed tickets were successful in more than a score of other places.

SOME CLOSE FIGURING. WASHINGTON, April 3.—Bids were opened at the navy department to-day for the construction of armed coast defense of the vessels of the Monitor type, four thousand tons burden. The bids for construction of hull and machinery, according to the department's designs, were Cramp & Sons, of Philadelphia, \$1,614,000; Guillard Iron Works, of New York, \$1,590,000; Union Iron Works, of San Francisco, \$1,528,550. No award has yet been made.

DEVASTATING FIRES. BLUNT, Dak., April 3.—The whole country around Blunt is being devastated by prairie fires. Several buildings in the suburbs have been burned, but the city is, as yet, safe.

J. I. Richardson lost 500 sheep, cattle and hogs. Many farmers are homeless. A strong wind arose before the fire, doing much damage.

A SOUTHERN TRIP. BALTIMORE, April 3.—Ex-senator Horace Davis and family started on a southern trip this morning. At Washington they expect to be joined by Mrs. Harrison, wife of the president, and her daughter Mrs. McKee. They go to Charleston, Jacksonville and St. Augustine.

THE HURRICANE'S TRACK. AUGLAND, April 3.—The recent hurricane in the south caused great damage on the island of Tahiti. Part of the island is submerged and many of the inhabitants are drowned. On the island of Tonga the hurricane created great havoc and thirty persons perished.

ROUGH ON ERNEST. WINNEPEG, April 3.—Last night citizens caught a music teacher named Ernest who had been too intimate with another man's wife, dosed him with paragonic and axle grease and gave him a coat of feathers and ran him out of town.

GEN. BOULANGER'S MANIFESTO. PARIS, April 3.—General Boulanger has issued a manifesto from Brussels to the French people saying he will not submit to a trial by the senate but he is willing to be tried before a magistrate or jury. He says he will await the elections which will make the republic habitable, honest and free.

BOULANGER IN BELGIUM. BRUSSELS, April 3.—Boulanger and Arene members of the French chamber of deputies, arrived at Mons, Belgium this morning. They were met at the railway station by Roehfort: the party repaired to the hotel where they held a conference.

WHY HE LEFT PARIS. PARIS, April 3.—The Presse says Boulanger left Paris at the request of friends who were informed that he would be tried by an exceptional tribunal and would not escape alive. During his absence Boulanger will continue the struggle for revision of the constitution.

MONSIEUR BRUNO. BRUSSELS, April 3.—Boulanger is stopping at the hotel, Mengella; he registered under the name of Bruno, after a conference with Roehfort, at Mons this morning he returned here. A demonstration in his honor was made both at Mons and this city. The Independence Belge, warns him that his expulsion from Belgium will follow an intrigue on his part against the government.

GOING TO MAKE A MARTYR OF HIM. PARIS, April 3.—A rumor is current that the government is about to issue a decree of banishment against Boulanger.
