OUR PORTLAND LETTER.

Death of Mrs. Esther Holladay.

PORTLAND, April 5.—Early last month Dr. E. A. Jones was fined \$150 in the justice court, for having disposed of morphine pills to Theodore Mills; the latter committed suicide. The Dr. appealed from the justice's decision and the case came up for trial before Judge Stearns to-day. The evidence against him was conclusive and the jury brought in a verdict of guilty, a little after noon. Sentence will be pronounced to-morrow.

S. G. Fulton, of the Northern Pacific railroad returned this morning from a ten days trip through Washington territory and Idaho and reports business all through the eastern portion of the territory pushing rapidly ahead. A very prosperous year is anticipated.

Mrs. Esther Holladay, widow of Ben Holladay, died this afternoon, after a lingering illness. She was married in this city in '74, and leaves two children.

There are now 13 vessels in this port. The outgoing steamer will sail hence to-night carrying 1,000 tons freight: among other articles, 38 tons paper of Oregon manufacture.

John Dronillard who killed Pedro Riberos, is lying in a cage at the county jail but refuses to talk about the crime. His lawyer claims he will be able to make out a case of self defense.

Harrison's War on The Mugwumps.

PARIS, April 5.—The opportunists and radical press regard the vote in the chamber of deputies yesterday authorizing the prosecution of Boulanger as the death blow to Boulanger. Count Dillon and Rochefort will be prosecuted for connection with Boulanger.

A SOLEMN FAIR.

PARIS, April 5.—The senate will begin the trial of Boulanger, Monday. During the trial no session of the chamber of deputies will be held.

A FINE VESSEL.

WASHINGTON, April 5.—The German corvette *Sophia*, which sails from Zanzibar to-day for Samoa is a fine ship, superior to either the *Adams* or the *Alert*, which will constitute the American squadron at Samoa. She is of composite type, 17 knots, 2,200 tons, carries 8 6-inch and 2 3/4-inch rifles and four machine guns with torpedo outfit and used forced draft, which engineer experts think contributed to the escape of the English war vessel *Calliope*.

THE OFFICIAL PROGRAMME.

NEW YORK, April 5.—The official programme for the celebration of Washington's inauguration as first president of the United States is published. The principal features are the opening of the exhibition of historical portraits, April 17; arrival of President Harrison from Elizabethport, and a naval review with a centennial ball in the evening, April 29th. Thanksgiving services in churches, those at St. Paul's being attended by the president, followed by commemorative centennial exercises at the sub-treasury building and a great military parade, followed by reception and banquet, April 30th; industrial and civic parade May 1st, and close of the historical loan exhibition May 8th. The military parade will include military and naval cadets, troops of the regular army and the national guard, the following order for each state contingent being headed by its governor and his staff: Delaware, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Georgia, Connecticut, Massachusetts, Maryland, South Carolina, New Hampshire, Virginia, New York, North Carolina and Rhode Island and the other states follow in the order admitted into the Union. Following will be 200 companies of the Loyal Legion and then posts of the Grand Army. The commemorative exercises will consist of prayer by Rev. Dr. R. S. Storrs, a poem by John Greenleaf Whittier, an oration by Channsey M. Depew, an address by President Harrison and a benediction by archbishop Corrigan.

COUNT MARTIAL RECOMMENDED.

WASHINGTON, April 5.—Major General Schofield, commanding the army has decided to recommend to the secretary of war that Major Geo. A. Arms, retired, be tried by court martial on the charges based on his conduct inauguration day and his assault on Governor Beaver.

MORE APPOINTMENTS.

WASHINGTON, April 5.—President Harrison appointed J. B. Erhardt, collector of customs in New York; Cornelius Vangott, postmaster of New York; Schuyler Barry, of Virginia, chief clerk of the patent office, Vice Leipscomb, resigned.

WHO JOEL IS.

NEW YORK, April 5.—Joel B. Erhardt, appointed collector of customs of New York, was the Republican candidate for mayor at the election last fall. The selection has no particular significance, as about all the leading Republicans favor his appointment.

KEMPINSKI'S CASE.

WASHINGTON, April 5.—Secretary Blaine has been informed by the secretary of the Legation at St. Petersburg that he has already requested the Russian government to investigate the case of Kempinski, who is said to be a naturalized American citizen, and who was sent to Siberia by the Russian authorities upon his return to Russia. It has been reported to the department that Kempinski was eighteen or nineteen years of age when he left Russia for the United States. While the department will investigate the case thoroughly, there is need for caution, for with this statement of the case it may appear that Kempinski was eligible for military service, and that his emigration to the United States was nothing less than military desertion.

NEW TO-DAY.

BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA: A PROCLAMATION. THE FOLLOWING PROVISIONS OF THE ACT OF MARCH 2, 1889, entitled "An act to provide for the information of all concerned," are hereby published for the information of all concerned: "Section 1. That Section 1066, Revised Statutes, chapter 3, title 22, enacts that 'No person shall kill any other, mak marten, sable, or fur seal, or other fur-bearing animal, or in the waters thereof; and every person guilty thereof shall, for each offense, be fined not less than two hundred nor more than one thousand dollars, or imprisoned not more than six months, or both, and the vessel, tackle, and cargo, found engaged in violation of this section shall be forfeited, but the Secretary of the Treasury shall have power to authorize the killing of any such mink, marten, sable, or other fur-bearing animal, under such regulations as he may prescribe, and it shall be the duty of the Secretary to prepare the killing of any fur seal, and to provide for the execution of the provisions of this section until it is otherwise provided by law, nor shall he grant any special privileges under this section.'"

Section 2 of the act entitled "An act to provide for the protection of the salmon fisheries of Alaska," approved March 2, 1889, provides that: "Section 3. That Section 1956 of the Revised Statutes of the United States is hereby declared to be inoperative in all the waters of the United States in the waters of Behring Sea, and it shall be the duty of the President to issue his proclamation, and cause the same to be published for one month at least in one newspaper (if any such there be) published at each United States port of entry on the Pacific coast, warning all persons engaged in the fishing of salmon, that any person who shall violate the provisions of said section shall be liable to arrest and seizure of his vessel and gear, and to be proceeded against as provided in said section." Now therefore, I, Benjamin Harrison, President of the United States, pursuant to the above recited Statutes, hereby warn all persons against entering the waters of Behring Sea, within the dominion of the United States, for the purpose of violating the provisions of said section 1956, Revised Statutes; and I hereby proclaim, that all persons found to be, or have been engaged in any violation of the laws of the United States in said waters, shall be arrested and punished as above provided, and that all vessels so employed, their tackle, apparel, furniture and cargoes will be seized and forfeited.

In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed. [SIGNED.] Done at the City of Washington this twenty-first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, and of the independence of the United States the one hundred and thirteen.
