### SLAUGHTER OF SEALS.

An Event in the History of the Lower St. Lawrence.

MONTREAL, April 18.—Dispatches from the lower St. Lawrence and the gulf tell of the most remarkable event that has ever occurred in these localities.

From the upper end of Anticosti island to the Magellan island a driving, blinding snowstorm began on Tuesday and on the night of the same day great flocks of ice began to come down from the St. Lawrence and the Saguenay.

The few people along the north and south shores and on Anticosti who were ashore on Wednesday morning witnessed a sight that startled them. As far as the eye could see up, down and across the gulf the flocks, still moving, were packed with harp or Greenland seals. The ice was fairly black with them. It was impossible to hunt them in the moving ice, but during the afternoon the snowstorm ceased and the ice packed.

Then everybody, old women, boys, girls, old men and farmers for miles around, armed themselves with clubs, hatchets, or any other weapon they could get hold of, and went on to the ice after the seals.

It was a fearful slaughter, and the poor animals seemed so dazed by the sudden attack that they were absolutely incapable of making their escape. A knock on the head was sufficient to settle them, and before night every person that could walk had his or her pile of dead seals awaiting transfer to the shore.

In Gagne there were over 4,000 killed, and one priest had 300 to his credit. Along the north shore, from Tennois to the Mingan Isles, there were 3,000 taken, and in the Esquimaux Isles the slaughter was fearful.

On Anticosti the greatest number were taken at Point-au-Lepinet, where the shores are still heaped with carcasses awaiting skinning and boiling down.

The son of the lighthouse keeper at Point Cormorant killed 450 seals and lost 100 of them because he could not get them ashore before night set in, when it became dangerous to go on the ice.

In the Magellan islands and on the Bird rocks, the killing amounted to 7,000 up to Friday morning, and it was still going on.

At Howe Bay-Basque the inhabitants continued their work at night, the flocks covered with seals, drifting into the horseshoe like harbor and remaining there.

At Grinshu, the wonderful incursion of seals was a godsend to the people, who have earned enough within a few days to keep them a year.

On the Bird rock carcasses are piled up like so many bags of potatoes, and the people are opulent in their richness. There must have been at least 500,000 seen altogether, and the total number killed during the three days will reach over 150,000.

They are not the fur seals of Alaska, but they are valuable for their oil and their hides are used for boots, trunk covers, etc. They are worth here \$3 each, and the fat is worth \$5 per hundred-weight. Fishermen have been sent from Quebec to the gulf, and an enormous number of seals are expected to be killed. Never in the history of the gulf has so many been seen at one time.

### Made a King of Himself.

CHICAGO, April 18.—The Daily News Washington special says: A very pretty little story, which promises to develop into an interesting trial, comes to Washington from Alaska.

It is to the effect that about three years ago a man named McPherson sailed from San Francisco, and eventually landed on one of the Aleutian islands off the coast of Alaska. Mr. McPherson's entire outfit consisted of a suit of clothes, an American flag and cheek enough for a whole regiment, together with a paper purporting to have been signed by attorney-general Garland appointing him United States commissioner.

As soon as he landed on the island he raised the American flag with a great deal of ceremony, and took command of the 600 natives, and compelled them to address him as "king" McPherson. Each season he exacted a heavy tribute from the natives, and altogether he seems to have been having a lovely time. Things went along very smoothly until a few months ago, when he had some difficulty with three of his subjects, and fearing that there might be a mutiny, hanged three of the rebellious ones.

The report of McPherson's rule reached the treasury department, and a special agent was sent to his island to investigate the matter. This agent recently reported the facts to secretary Windom substantially as they are given above.

Now it is said that a revenue cutter will be sent to the island for the purpose of arresting McPherson. It is the intention of the authorities to bring him to San Francisco and try him for murder.
