New York.-April 19.-All the steamers which possibly could have been in the neighborhood of the wrecked steamer Danmark, have arrived but no tidings of those on board has been received. The only hope is that they were picked up by a sailing vessel and taken probably to the Azores Islands.

NO USE FOR MORMONS. Sr. Louis, April 19.—Information comes from Sale county, Alabama, that five Mormon missionaries were severely whipped and driven from the county last Monday night. These men had been holding meetings among the ignorant classes in the county and had formed a colony to go

On Monday night some forty citizens of the northern part of the county without the slightest attempt at disguise or concealment sur-rounded the house of Gid Irons, a recent convert, who was entertaining the five missionaries and without an delay they were brought out, stripped to the waist and tied in a row. Then each of the regulators with long switches struck each of the prisoners a sounding blow.

By the time the last blow was given two of the man had fainted and the others were wet with blood. After whipping them the men's legs were given a thick coating of tar and feathers and they were warned to leave instantly or suffer death.

IMPORTANT LAND DECISION Washington, April 19.—Secretary Noble has rendered a decision in a California land case which is of great importance to the Pacific coast. It involves 500 or more land claims in California alone. It was brought be-for secretary Noble by Uriah Stone on an appeal from a ruling by the land commissioner, who rejected the commutation homestead proof of the appellant in his entry of a quarter section of land in the Sau Francisco district, and required him to submit new proof after due publication and posting notice before an officer authorized to take proof. The proof was rejected because it was advertised and taken before a superior court judge—an officer, it seems, not authorized to take commuted proof, as it should have been taken before a county clerk. The secretary says there is nothing to indicate that any one was misled because of this tech nical failure to comply with the law in its strictest sense, and interprets the law as having been substantially complied with.
