TELEGRAPHIC.

SPECIALS FROM ALL OVER THE WORLD.

Telegraphed Last Night to the Readers of The Astorian.

PORTLAND, June 20.—Sandy Olds, the slayer of Emil Weber was on trial to-day. Nothing was done but to secure a jury. Mrs. Barbara Braley of Ohio, sister of the dead man is here.

NEW BOAT LAUNCHED. The O. R. & N. Co.'s new Willamette river boat Modoc was launched this afternoon. She will draw only thirteen inches of water when loaded.

RHODE ISLAND TOO. PROVIDENCE, R. I., June 20.—This state is to-day voting on the question of repealing the state prohibition law. A three-fifths vote is necessary and the result is not at all certain. A huge vote is being polled. At eleven o'clock the vote stood in this city for repeal 352, against 1,317. The vote at one o'clock in this city stood approve 5,528, reject 1,728. News from other towns show a majority for approval.

PROVIDENCE, R. I., June 20.—Returns from all over the state indicate that the amendment will be adopted by a good majority over the necessary three-fifths.

O'CONNOR'S STATEMENT.

LONDON, June 20.—At a meeting of the Parnell commission to-day, Thomas P. O'Connor, M. P., was examined. He stated that the turning point of the agrarian struggle in Ireland was the rejection of the compensation for improvement bill. Thereupon tenants were compelled to combine in accordance with Parnell's policy, which substituted constitutional agitation for revolution, and open for secret combinations. O'Connor denied that either the league or he sympathized with the crime.

FLOODS IN KANSAS.

ST. LOUIS, June 20.—Dispatches from south eastern Kansas say that the Neosho river is at flood height and many thousand acres of wheat and other grain have been destroyed in Neosho county. The damage to growing crops is estimated at over a million dollars.

A CHICAGO SUSPECT.

WENNEPIE, June 20.—Collins, a Chicago detective, arrived shortly after 1 o'clock and is now with chief of police and Burke, the suspect. Collins has identified the man in custody here as Burke, wanted by the Chicago police. Steps for his extradition will be taken at once.

MAKING OUT A CASE.

CHICAGO, June 20.—The books of the Chicago National bank were called for by the Cronin grand jury to-day. An hour was spent in examining the accounts of Alexander Sullivan and comparing dates of certain checks with dates of Sullivan's operations. Evidence was given to show his intimacy with various suspects and to his frequently expressed animosity to Cronin.

MORE TROUBLE AT JOHNSTOWN.

JOHNSTOWN, Pa., June 20.—The strike among the laboring men here is fairly on this morning. Not a thousand men are at work. Dissatisfaction is spreading to other workmen. Overbearing bosses and short rations for which they are made to pay liberally, are the grievances.

A company of the fifth regiment has been ordered out. While everything appears quiet on the surface there are fears that a riot will follow.

A largely attended meeting of strikers was held this morning. A committee of twenty was appointed to confer with the men at work and find the exact number in sympathy with the strike. This committee will report at another meeting to be held at noon.

Three carloads of Italians arrived this morning. A committee of striking Italians persuaded them not to leave the train until the trouble was settled. They were side-tracked and beset with strikers. The committee appointed at the morning meeting reported an hour later. All foreign workmen have quit work.

Twenty-five bodies were recovered this morning, among them a mother and two children. The children were locked in the mother's arms.

MURDER IN CONNECTICUT.

NEW LONDON, Conn., June 20.—This morning Alva Park, a widower, aged 70, a fisherman, murdered a girl named Littlefield, aged 14, because she did not reciprocate his love. He shot her four times.

ARRESTED FOR LIBEL.

NEW YORK, June 20.—O'Donovan, Rossa, and Wilbur H. Hendrickson were arrested at noon at the office of the United Irishmen, on complaint of Patrick Sarsfield Cassidy, charging them with criminal libel. The prisoners were locked up and bail denied this afternoon.

SEIZED WITH YELLOW FEVER.

NEW YORK, June 19.—Dr. W. H. Duncan, surgeon of the Pacific mail steamship Colon from Aspinwall, was seized with yellow fever, and has been removed from Brooklyn to the quarantine: he is very much weaker.

MORMON PROSELYTES.

NEW YORK, June 20.—Three hundred and forty Mormon proselytes under the guidance of Elders Ellis and Anderson, landed at Castle Garden this morning. They go to Utah by way of Norfolk Virginia.

APPOINTED AS MEMBER.

WASHINGTON, June 20.—Ex-governor Hartranft, of Pennsylvania, has been appointed a member of the Cherokee commission.

EARTHQUAKE AT CHICO.

CHICO, Cal. June 19.—A slight earthquake shock was experienced here last evening about 10 o'clock.

AN INQUIRY ORDERED.

WASHINGTON, June 20.—The secretary of the navy has ordered an inquiry into the grounding of the steamer Constellation.

GEN. MYERS DEAD.

WASHINGTON, June 20.—Gen. A. C. Myers, late quartermaster general of the Confederate army, died here this morning.

MARINE DISASTER.

LONDON, June 20.—The steamer St. Mark has foundered near Muro, Spain. The crew was rescued.

A ROYAL RELAPSE.

THE HAGUE, June 20.—The king of Holland has had a serious relapse from his recent recovery.

HEAVY GOLD EXPORT.

NEW YORK, June 20.—Four million and a quarter of gold was taken for export to-day.

Verdict for the Plaintiff.

From the Telegram it is learned that the trial of the Goldsmith-Holmes suit has terminated in the United States circuit court by the jury bringing in a verdict in favor of the plaintiff. The facts concerning this suit have been reviewed comprehensively, and it is only necessary to say that the plaintiffs sued to recover \$10,000 and interest on a promissory note issued on the 9th of August, 1886, by W. F. Owens, of Roseburg, to Goldsmith & Co., The defendants in this suit, Holmes, Dillard and Phelps, subscribed themselves as sureties for Owens, who afterward failed and committed suicide. When his estate was settled up it was found that the note could not be paid out of the wreck, so a demand was made on the defendants to make good the amount. This they refused to do, saying that they never signed the note, and denounced the signatures as forgeries. Last December the case was tried and resulted in a disagreement by the jury. This time, however, the jury brought in a verdict for the plaintiff, and Wednesday morning the United States circuit court gave Goldsmith & Co. judgment for \$10,000, with interest since the date of the note.
