PORTLAND, June 28.—In the United States circuit court this morning John Drouillard was taken to trial for the murder of Pedro Riberos. He was defended by Messrs. Raleigh Stott and Sweeney Smith. The day was spent in examining witnesses. At present writing Drouillard is still on the stand. The trial elicited no new developments.

The grand jury to-day found indictments against a certain class of the demit Monday-morning crowd, who were arrested and fined. A number getting wind of the intended raid fled from their houses.

Next Monday morning Major W. A. Jones of the United States engineers corps will put a force of surveyors on Postoffice bar to set stakes and arrange lines to be followed by the dredge, which will be put to work there immediately.

The city dredge has been thoroughly cleaned out and is now ready for use. It is dredged the plant will be moved to St. Helens where work will be begun and vigorously prosecuted.

The steamers *Ensign* and *Dieci Thompson* will convey the party and do all necessary steamboat work. Improvements at Postoffice and St. Helens bars are badly needed.

It is authentically reported that a charge of venue will be applied for in the case of Sandy Olds the murderer of Emil Weber. The ground upon which the application is to be based is that the local press has so prejudiced the community against defendant that it is impossible for him to get a fair trial in this city.

The grand jury reported the following not true bills to-day: Frankie Bersie and H. Williams accused of adultery. Tom Campbell charged with the crime of mayhem by biting the thumb of James Gorman. Also an indictment was returned against David Cameron for larceny from the person of James Graham.

THE SAMOAN TREATY.
New York, June 28.—William Walter Phelps, commissioner to the Samoan conference, has arrived from Europe. He would say little concerning the treaty, except that he thought it would please everybody and that when the Samoans read it they would erect a monument to the commissioners.

"We began the conference in French," said Mr. Phelps. "Every member present understood French, German and English, and we Americans proposed that we should carry on the conference in the English tongue. Six out of nine voted affirmatively and it was done. Even the draft of the treaty was made out in English. We found that the Samoans made more clear and explicit than it written in French. Therefore, this is the first time that an international conference has been carried on in the English tongue. We have established a precedent and it would not be surprising if every future conference of the kind should be carried on in English. It is the language of the world."

PRESIDENTIAL POSTMASTERS.
WASHINGTON, June 28.—The annual review of the salaries of presidential postmasters is completed. The number of presidential postoffices is 2,637; total salaries, \$4,414,703. The annual receipts of the offices are over \$41,000,000.

UNION WORKS TO BE GRANTED TIME.
WASHINGTON, June 28.—Secretary Tracy has decided to grant an extension on the time for the completion of the *Charleston* by the Union Iron works, but as to the length of the extension has not come to a conclusion. He feels favorably toward extending the time six weeks from date, but may only allow an extension from the date set for the completion.

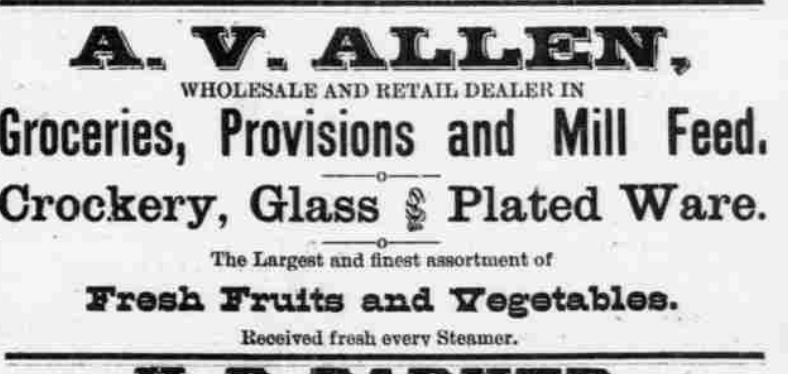
