One man from Tacoma arrived last Thursday with \$125,000 to put into Astoria real estate.

Considerable building is in progress at the Seaside, and that section shares in the general activity.

The R. R. Thompson will have to have a new cylinder put in and will be ready for service about July 8th.

Large quantities of wild blackberries are being brought in and find ready sale for domestic canning purposes.

Yesterday's steady soaking rain made it impossible that any damage to property in this section will result from fire this year.

The crew of the *Manzanita* is to have new uniforms, much the same as used by sailors in the navy. They are expected to arrive from Washington to-day.

Anything in the way of a conveyance from a single horse cart to a six horse double under furnished at short notice at Sherman & Ward's livery stable.

C. A. Mann two weeks ago bought three lots for \$500 each, between the O. R. & N. dock and Jno. A. Devlin's cannery. Yesterday he refused \$1,000 apiece for them.

The ladies society of the Norwegian and Danish M. E. church of upper Astoria will give a social and auction this evening, a good time promised for all that attend.

The attention of the Capital Journal is gently directed to the "fact" that this county has not sent prisoners to the penitentiary, "in a few days" as prophesied. "Opinions" are sometimes distinct from "facts."

We unintentionally omitted the name of Miss Nellie Carnahan from the list of teachers elected by the directors of school district No. 10 in yesterday's issue, a deserved endorsement of a successful teacher.

The disabling of the R. R. Thompson cuts down by one for the present the number of the boats on the lower river. There are none too many now for the traffic, and additional new water crafts will soon be needed.

The interior department is advised that the superintendent of the Indian training school at Salem, has forwarded his resignation by mail. The Oregon delegation have united on Rev. G. M. Irwin, of Union City, as Irwin's successor.

Seattle cannot get rid of the nineteen Chinamen who have been held in arrest for two years for attempting to smuggle themselves into the United States. Victoria, B. C., whence they came, won't receive them back unless \$50 a head is paid and the Seattle authorities cannot turn them loose.

Admiral Harmony, chairman of the lighthouse board, has issued a notice that on or about August 1st a light of the first order, giving alternately a red and a white flash every fifteen seconds, will be shown from the structure recently erected near the westerly end of Moro Rock, Point Sur, Cal.

Mr. Jackson, an experienced civil engineer and architect, yesterday began with six assistants the work of enlarging Smith's Point in lots and blocks, commencing at the meander line. Mr. Jackson is the gentleman who laid out the famous Coronado beach at San Diego, Cal., and directed the plans for the Coronado hotel, the largest in the world. He expects to get through with his present work in about six weeks.

The steam schooner *Leo*, which was sunk at Port Houghton Bay, Alaska, last winter and reported a total wreck, has been raised and taken to Port Townsend. After she had laid on the bottom three months she was raised by sinking barrels into her hold and pumping the water out of them after they were in. The captain says that after she had been out of the water two hours steam was raised in her boiler and the engine found in perfect order.

Col. Beebe slightly overdid things in asking that a squad of ten men be furnished transportation and everything in return for the loan of a gun to fire the Fourth of July salutes in this city. He can keep his gun. The captains of the British vessels *Wanlock* and *Borronade* yesterday kindly placed at the disposal of P. W. Weeks, two fine cannons, one of them a ten-pounder, which will make the echoes at sunrise next Thursday. Thanks are extended the British mariners for their courtesy.

The Union Pacific consolidation will go into effect next week. The general manager will have his offices at Salt Lake City, U. T. Five lines are thus being brought under the management. These are the Utah Central, from Salt Lake to Frisco, talked of as the probable route through Los Angeles and the south; the Salt Lake and Western, running from Salt Lake to Tintic; the Utah and Western, between Ogden and Battle City, the Utah and Nevada, Mormon City to Tooele, and the Oregon Short Line.

A new Scandinavian journal in Minneapolis is printed in the English language, and the reasons given for this worthy the attention of foreign-born citizens. It says that it is the desire of the Scandinavian population to enter fully into the spirit of American life. "But it is also more and more dawning upon them that in order to do that they must employ the English language. By that

means alone can they ever hope to become a live factor in the development of their adopted country. The gateway to influence, social and political, to a full participation in the building up of America, opens through the English language.

With the completion of the state road through this and Clatsop and Washington counties, says the *Mit*, a mail route should be established from Astoria to Forest Grove, so as to give the Nehalem people better and more frequent mail service than they now have. As was stated by our Vernonia correspondent last week, it requires a week for a letter to go from our office to another in Nehalem, and the same length of time for a letter to reach Astoria or the Washington county offices. Mail by this route and with the St. Helens and Clatskanie routes, which should be increased to twice a week, would give the Nehalem mail facilities equal to other parts of the state.

## SIZE OF THE FEMALE BUST.

Breadth of the Shoulders Should be the Same as the Hips.

A lady correspondent of the New York Press writes: "I had an argument with a lady about the size of a grown female's bust. She says that the difference in size between the waist and under arms should be ten inches. I think four or five inches at the outside measure. P. S.—The natural size is what is wanted, and not one distorted with corsets or squeezing."

In order to decide this question two women physicians have been consulted on the subject. Mrs. Mary Putnam Jacobi says:

"There is no fixed proportion between the size of the bust and the size of the waist. Still less can there be any fixed measurement for either waist or bust, seeing that this must vary with the height of the individual, and with other circumstances. The most general rule about the typical female figure is that the breadth of the shoulders should correspond to the breadth of the hips, while in the man the shoulders are much broader than the hips. The size of the waist varies not only with expansion of the lower part of the chest, but also with the development of the muscles and the amount of fat upon them."

"The test of tight lacing is not the absolute size of the waist, but the degree of compression of the soft parts needed in order to allow the corset or dress to fasten. When there is no compression the corset should fasten easily in the middle. But, naturally, the corset cannot be fastened to middle until the top has been fastened. It is then always too tight."

"Undeveloped chests and waists are not always due to compression of clothing, but to lack of systematic development by exercise and gymnastics during the growing period—that is from 10 to 18. It is precisely then that corsets are most dangerous and precisely then that mothers apply them to 'form the figure.' If not worn before 25, corsets may be worn afterwards with impunity."

Dr. Mary Gage said that her attention had never been called to the point in question, as the proportionate size of a woman measured under her arm and around her waist are nothing to do with her health.

"But," she said, "I should give as my opinion that ten inches is nearer the proportionate difference than four or five."

Then, to prove that she was right, she kindly took the trouble to measure four women on the spot. In two instances there was a difference of eight inches between the waist and the bust measure. In the third there was nine and in the fourth ten. All of the women were well proportioned. After the measurement of a woman was taken who had never worn corsets in her life, the difference between the two points was barely six inches. Dr. Gage brought up in an argument in favor of her own decision that the ready made waists sold to a woman of ordinary size were shaped in exact proportion to that she had named—that is, ten inches difference between the bust measure and the waist.
