Six years ago at 6 P. M., Astoria got a bad scorching.

There will be 10,000 people in Astoria next Thursday.

There will be two full bands in the parade on the Fourth.

A very light salmon run is reported up and down the river.

Every street in town should be cleaned up for the Fourth and fifth.

The sunrise, noon and sunset salutes will be fired from Flavel's dock.

The barkentine Ella sailed for San Francisco loaded with lumber, yesterday.

Every organization in the city is invited to take part in the parade on the Fourth.

The schooner Sparrow from Eureka loaded with redwood lumber arrived last evening.

The British bark Highmoor, 1,113 tons register arrived from New Castle, N. S. W., yesterday.

THE ASTORIAN is sixteen years old to-day. Last July it was fifteen years old; next July it will be seventeen years old, and thus we go.

John Turpie has bonded to Howell Lewis S. W. 1/2 sec. 19, and N. W. 1/2 sec. 30, T. 8, N. R. 8, W. except 10 acres in N. W. cor. sec. 30, for \$4,000.

The tug Astoria will tow the schooner Neptune to sea this morning and then proceed to Shoalwater bay to tow out the barkentine Web-foot.

All entries for the fishing-boat race and the Whitehall boat race must be made with P. W. Weeks and Wm. Johnson by 3 o'clock to-morrow afternoon.

Timber land to the south of us is being rapidly taken up. The last issue of the Tillamook Headlight to hand contains 132 timber land notices.

Theo. Benson, a native of Norway, aged 37 years, died at St. Mary's hospital Sunday morning. He was buried from Surprenant's undertaking rooms yesterday morning.

All members of the department, belonging to the team of which E. S. Worsley is captain will meet at the house of Rescue No. 2 this Tuesday evening at 7:45 for practice.

A large audience in the opera house was present last evening to witness the opening performance of the George Woodthorpe Comedy company in their ideal play, entitled "Golden Giant." The performance for this evening will be "May Blossom."

Word came last evening of a very serious accident to Mrs. Wirt at Skipanon yesterday afternoon, she having been thrown from a wagon, sustaining very serious injuries. C. A. McGuire came over shortly after the accident and returned at seven p. m. with some of Mrs. Wirt's relatives and a doctor.

Last Saturday night THE ASTORIAN was given a news item with the assurance that it was "so." It wasn't printed, not being considered authentic, but yesterday the writer was told it again, and there may be something in it. It is this: The O. R. & N. Co. has railroad surveyors and engineers out on a line down the river. They started last Thursday, and are skirting the south bank of the river. It may be so.

Sundry real estate agents yesterday sold to Mrs. Thos. Byrre and Mrs. J. O. There was also sold lots 5 and 6, block 22 Shively's Astoria for the sum of \$3,100 to Rev. L. Dielman. This is known as the Ferry property.

E. C. Stamper, a citizen of Elma, has just completed working up a fir tree which grew on his place adjoining town. He received \$12 for the bark; built a frame house 14x20 feet 8 feet high, with shed kitchen 8 feet wide and 20 feet long; built a wood shed 14x20 feet; made 33 fence rails 10 feet long; made 334 railroad ties and 500 boards 6 inches wide and 2 feet long, and 15 cords of wood 4 feet wide and 8 feet long, all from one tree, and has a part of the tree left.

COUNTY COURT PROCEEDINGS.

Sheriff Smith returns delinquent tax list and asks for settlement, and after examining funds and allowing credits, \$5,902.63 finds errors in assessing \$1,067.76 and excess of costs over amount of sale, \$196.49 and that there is still unpaid \$714.04, mortgages and credits, and therefore is made a complete settlement, and that the sheriff be discharged as tax collector on the roll of 1888, and his bondmen exonerated, and so ordered by the court.

The county treasurer and county treasurer, made report and being examined the county clerk is instructed to correct the books and balance accordingly.

The report of the commissioners on the wagon road to Columbia county filed, and the matter postponed till July 15th and bids asked for as per notice, notice hereafter published.

School superintendent's report read and clerk ordered to compare and report.

Clerk instructed to prepare and present report to this court July 15th, 1889.

Clerk authorized to draw a warrant for board for sheriff, \$448.38.

Report of commissioners and surveyors on wagon road, read and laid over until July 15th, 1889.

Adjourned to that date.

The Astoria papers state that the Astoria and South Coast E. R. Co. has made a contract with the Pacific Construction Co. to construct its road to a connection with the Willamette valley. This would be good news if the Construction Co. had the necessary means to carry out its contracts.

The company was organized to build the Portland & Willamette Valley railway, and has a capital stock of \$30,000, in 500 shares, the subscribers being: Wm. Reid, 151 shares, J. M. Bower 146, J. W. Graham 1, W. M. Watson 1, and D. N. Goldberg 1; and there has never been a dollar paid up! The responsibility of the company is certainly not a sufficient guarantee that the Astoria people will realize their wish, much as we should like to see our neighbors thrive. It looks very much as if they had sold out to, and been swallowed by a very small concern.

The statement of the Astoria papers that the company must be either the outgrowth of a very vivid imagination or a willful falsehood to induce the A. & S. C. R. R. to part with valuable property. The Pacific Construction company were unable, after the most persistent advertising, offering most favorable terms, to sell more than a small fraction of the Portland & Willamette Ry. bonds. Apparently the Astoria people have been led to think that the contractors were the Pacific Improvement Co., a California corporation, instead of the Oregon company.—Journal of Commerce, June 29.
