OCCASIONALLY we hear it said of some good-natured, generous, whole souled individual, "he hasn't got an enemy in the world." How we pity the man who has to battle his way through life, and can do it without making an enemy. When he has been gulled, swindled and imposed upon by those who are always ready to take advantage of good nature, how often he must feel like kicking himself or letting out the job to a friend. An enemy is about the most useful friend a man can have. It is evidence that he has a mind of his own and stamina enough to carry out his own views. It begets a species of individuality, and at the same time reminds one if he has faults, (and we know none who haven't) that his enemy will pick them out, and very probably magnify them with as little compunction as he would a fish story. He enables you to observe that you have faults which might otherwise pass unnoticed and places you in a position where they must be shaken off or concealed, or else become a subject of gossip and comment amongst the friends of your enemy. Your enemy exercises a very great influence in keeping all your faculties on the alert. You are well aware what the consequences will be if you are not at your post or are caught napping. Another thing about it is that by having an enemy you are more likely to find out who your true friends are. No real friend will stand by and hear his friend maligned, particularly behind his back. He is quite likely to insist on proof of any injurious statement, and there isn't even a truthful man who could undertake to prove one-tenth of his assertions. He could afford the necessary time. Follow your enemy and you will find your friends. The next best thing to a good friend is an open enemy. Show us the man who has ever attained a high position by his own exertions, who hasn't an enemy. As the Hoosier said of the barrel of whisky, "It's a good thing to have in a house where there's no milk." So it is with an enemy. If you want to encourage a feeling of self reliance and confidence in your own ability, cultivate an open enemy to remind you of your shortcomings.
