AFRICA has become so popular a sporting ground that the large game is becoming scarce.

THE Russian government proposes to raise a new loan, to be used in the building of strategic railways.

ON the same Sunday recently one missionary and 50,000 cases of liquor were landed at an African port.

IN April over three hundred and ten million cigars were made, five for each inhabitant of the United States.

A NEW oil company has been organized at Cincinnati, which it is expected will be a rival to the Standard monopoly.

ACTIVE opposition is developing against the proposition to include a prohibitory clause in the south Dakota constitution.

MANY of the friends of Henry George are urging him to become a British subject and enter parliament for a Scotch district.

JOHNSTOWN folks are not going to live in the Chicago portable houses. They only cost \$100 apiece and are little more than coal-sheds.

IT is now thought that the loss of life at Johnstown will not exceed 4,000; up to July 1st the property losses reported amount to \$6,000,000.

LOUISIANA is becoming a sort of limbo to which Americans consign what they will not have anywhere else—lotteries and prize fights, for instance.

MONTANA has added to her good fortune of the present year by the discovery within her borders of two veins of gold and silver-bearing quartz—one at Granite, the other at Champion.

THE Indiana law to prevent the sale of Chicago dressed beef in Indiana has been declared unconstitutional. Free trade between the several states is a principle firmly imbedded in the constitution.

THE steamships that leave the Atlantic ports in these times are carrying an unusually large number of steerage passengers to Europe. Most of them are foreigners who have been disappointed in America.

A BAKING-POWDER man started in with a cash capital of \$12,500 twenty years ago, cleared up \$8,000,000 in the business; and recently sold out his interest for \$2,500,000. The baking powder man is bound to rise.

IT is said that the preliminary assessment of Philadelphia electors, just completed, indicates a population of a million and a quarter. This would bring Philadelphia pretty close to New York on the score of population.

GOVERNOR BECKER recently declined to furnish a copy of the constitution of Kentucky to be filed with an exhibit at the Paris exposition, because, according to that constitution, slavery appears to be still existing in the commonwealth.

THE next census will contain the amount of mortgaged indebtedness of the country, when the public will be able to understand to what extent the west is indebted to the east for capital to carry on its business, and who holds the mortgages.

THE German anarchists in New York city are of the opinion that their number will be increased within a short time. Bismarck is pressing Switzerland to expel those of them who have taken refuge on her soil, and the pressure is of a kind that is hard to resist.

CAPTAIN GASHINSKI of the Polish guards at La Salle, Ill., shot his wife and held the police at bay with two pistols. The fire department was called out and had commenced to pour two streams of water on him, when he placed his weapons, one to his heart, the other to his head, and fired.

MASTER WORKMAN POWDERLY says: "The Knights of Labor are holding their own. We have got rid of the internal dissensions that made us so much trouble. I might tell you that we are gaining thousands of new members, and all that sort of stuff, but I won't as I said before, we are holding our own."

THE plates now form more than a half in weight and a third in value of the British iron exports to this country, and are the only important item of such exports that is not decreasing. It is not at all surprising then that the organs of the free trade party should receive the proposal to increase the duty and make the plates at home with so much displeasure and consternation.

THE ignorant, pleasure-loving, happy-go-lucky negro of Washington is as carefully discriminating with reference to the payment of bills as the insolvent merchant who is making a list of preferred creditors. The grocer or butcher who trusts him is often likely to wait for his money until the ink on the account-book becomes pale and illegible, but the professional man—the doctor or the lawyer—always gets his money. He looks upon a doctor with a kind of superstitious respect. The simplicity of his mind makes him an uncanny being who brings about wonderful results by means that can be little short of supernatural. 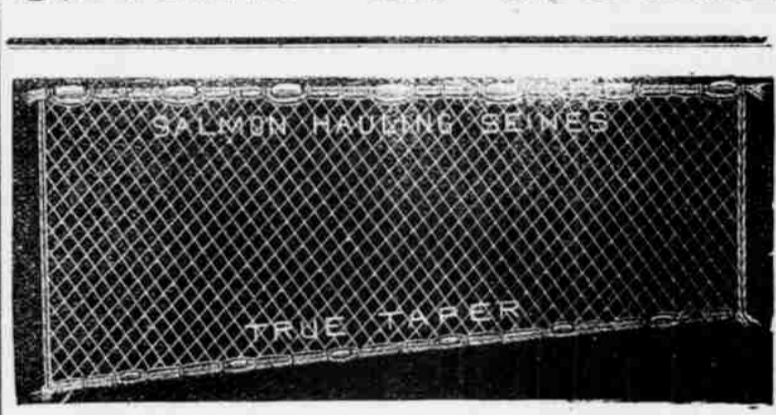
