Terrible Fall of Two Railroad Men.

John L. Sullivan Trying to Get Away.

Latest News Notes From Various Sources.

PORTLAND, July 12.—Joseph Merrick, recently sentenced to a term of imprisonment in the county jail by Judge Denny, is in trouble again this morning, an officer having arrived here from Pendleton for Merrick, he being wanted there for the crime of forgery.

KANSAS DETECTIVES.
G. W. Cartwright and J. H. Clemens, the Kansas officers who came here yesterday for Mrs. Lizzie Walker, the alleged murderer, are still in the city. They are impressed with the belief that the woman is still in town and is kept in hiding.

BADLY BROKEN UP.
About 9 o'clock last night two young men, Elmer Swan and Peter Boyd, both of this city, while riding on a railroad vehicle along the line of the P. & W. V. R. R., at a point one mile and a quarter beyond Dundee, threw from the track, a distance of eighty-five feet, and badly injured. Elmer Swan is a son of ex-policeman Enos Swan, and since the first of May has been working for the company as engine wiper. He is a large man, 25 years of age. Boyd is 30 years old and for some time has been a master mechanic on the narrow gauge railroad.

Yesterday afternoon they took a velocipede out to run up the track in search for fires, and were on the way back when in rounding a steep curve the velocipede jumped the track, throwing both men to the bottom of the ravine. The machine lit on top of the men, cutting Swan's face in a terrible manner, breaking his left leg at the thigh; his upper jaw was broken in several places; in fact completely crushed; his nose was mashed horribly. Boyd's injuries consisted of both legs being broken, the right one at the thigh and the left below the knee; both of them being compound fractures. When the machine struck them it pinned Boyd to the ground so that he could not move. All night he lay with Swan at the bottom of the cold damp gulch, calling as loudly as he could for help. Swan was unconscious till seven o'clock this morning, when an old lady and her boy came along and found them. She took the velocipede off of Boyd's arm and gave them both some water and sent her little boy for help.

The news reached Dundee, and a party went out with a special engine and brought the injured men to this city, when they were taken to the Portland hospital. Swan was so badly hurt about the groin that the surgeon could not ascertain the extent of his injuries.

So far as internal ruptures are concerned, he is more seriously injured it is thought than Boyd, and resting under the influence of powerful opiates. Boyd's bones were broken in a fearful manner. Where the break occurred the ends of the bones protruded through the flesh several inches. His father who lives at Creston, Iowa, has been notified of the accident.

SULLIVAN OUT OF LIMBO.
EVANSVILLE, Ind., July 12.—John L. Sullivan and party passed through here at 1:30 this morning, en route from Portland to Nashville. None of the party showed themselves while lying at the depot. They intended to go, via Chicago to Canada.

HOW MULDON ESCAPED.
CHICAGO, July 12.—At Louisville last night an associate press reporter found Muldoon, Cleary, Parson Davies, of Chicago, and others of the Sullivan party who escaped arrest at Nashville yesterday and came with them to Chicago. They reached here at 7 o'clock this morning. At the outskirts of the city they left the train and took the outgoing train for the east, in order to avoid any chance of arrest. Muldoon escaped arrest at Nashville by pretending to be a virtuously indignant, and declaring to the police that he was no prize fighter, but a gentleman.

Muldoon says Kilrain was overruled and at least ten pounds too light.

SULLIVAN DISAPPEARS.
John L. Sullivan and Charlie Johnson reached Chicago at 11 o'clock, and left on the train at Twenty-second street and disappeared. No one at the sporting resorts of the city knew his whereabouts, he is supposed to have taken the train for the east, or is in hiding here.

MAY BE ARRESTED AGAIN.
NEW YORK, July 12.—A rumor is afloat that governor Hill, at the request of governor Lowry, of Mississippi, has granted an order for the arrest of John L. Sullivan, and that the papers for his requisition are now in the hands of superintendent of police Murray, of this city.

CHRISTOPHER COLUMBUS.
ROME, July 12.—A number of bishops have petitioned the Vatican to canonize Christopher Columbus on the anniversary of the discovery of America.

SEALING IN GREENLAND WATERS.
LONDON, July 12.—Whaling vessels at Dundee report the sealing and whaling vessels in Greenland waters and meeting with phenomenal success this season.

THE "NIPIC" TROUBLE.
WASHINGTON, July 12.—The navy department has not yet received official news of the trouble between Admiral Kimberly and Captain Mullen, growing out of the failure of the latter to take the Nipic to Auckland. The opinion is expressed, based on a San Francisco dispatch, that a court of inquiry will follow the captain's return to the United States.

AN EXTRA SESSION.
WASHINGTON, July 12.—That an extra session of congress is to be called is about as certain as anything can be which is that far in the future. The president told senator Washburn yesterday, when he mentioned that he was going abroad, that he had better make his plans so as to be here at the end of October. It is the general understanding among the senators and representatives that they are to be called in session about the 1st of November.

THE JOINTOWN LOSSES.

JOINTOWN, July 12.—The board of inquiry has prepared an estimate of the losses by the flood and make the total in excess of \$8,000,000.

There was a conference a few days ago between Judge Cummings, who has charge of the money collected for the benefit of the sufferers, and the local finance committee in regard to the manner in which the money, over \$3,000,000, should be distributed and it was agreed that each applicant should receive a certain percentage of the amount of his losses. Only the needy sufferers are to receive compensation, and some time must necessarily elapse to ascertain who the really needy are.

WASHINGTON, July 12.—Under a recent decision of the navy general command, it has been held that penalty envelops may be used by army officers in the transaction of post canteen business.

Soldiers may be granted permission to wear civilian clothing outside of post limits, but if brought into the garrison the clothing must be turned in for custody.

Publication of Land Notices.

Recently the Times, published at Templeton, San Luis Obispo county, removed its printing office to Santa Margarita, a neighboring town, although the proprietors maintain an office in Templeton and claimed that town as the place of publication for their paper.

The publishers of the Paso Robles Leader protested against land notices appearing in the Times, and claimed that such notices should appear in their journal, as it was the only one printed in the vicinity. The case was laid before the register of land office in this city, who submitted the matter to the general land office at Washington. To day he received the following:

Register and Receiver, San Francisco, Cal.—GENTLEMEN: Referring to the register's letter of the 21st, in relation to publication of final proof notices in the Templeton Times, you are informed that under a decision of the department, June 12, 1875, in the case of Gundlach private land claims, it was held that a newspaper though printed at San Francisco and published and distributed at Santa Barbara, sustained the character of a newspaper published at Santa Barbara, and according to this decision the Templeton Times is entitled to such notices as would come to it under the law as the newspaper nearest the land.
