GOOD GRIT.

CLEAR grit goes in railroad, as in a good many other branches of business, and the possession of it by vice-president King, of the Baltimore and Ohio railroad saved that company in the recent floods from the loss of its bridge at Harper's Ferry, and from the complete paralysis that would have ensued. The Potomac was even with the bottom of the bridge, and loaded with trees and heavy drift of all sorts when Mr. King got his grit to work. It is the most important bridge on the whole line of the road, and if it had gone down business would have had to be entirely suspended for at least a week or ten days, and probably for much longer, for the building of a temporary bridge would have been a difficult job. So Mr. King coolly ordered to the spot all the consolidated engines that he could get hold of by verbal orders or by telegraph. As fast as they arrived he sent them out upon the trembling bridge. There were ten of them there at last, all that the bridge would hold, and when the last one ran on, the water had risen so high over the floor of the bridge that it put out the fires in the engines. Consolidated engines are the costliest sort of rolling stock that a railroad has nowadays. They are used in hauling the heaviest trains, and weigh twice as much as what were considered a few years ago the heaviest practicable locomotives. If that bridge had gone down with those ten engines on it there would have been a loss of half a million dollars over and above the value of the bridge. Nobody who saw the bridge—what there was left of it above water—and the ten huge locomotives with their fires out and helpless as mere lumps of iron would have given a nickel for the chance of their ever being of further use to the Baltimore and Ohio railroad. Even gritty Mr. King bit the end of his cigar off as he reflected upon the excellent chance he had of being compelled to think up some explanations for the satisfaction of the board of directors. Grit won, however, and the hundreds of tons of dead weight that those engines placed upon the bridge held it down upon its piers until the water receded, and it could safely be left to stand alone. It was racked and strained, but it was all there and in condition for use without immediate repairs, so that the B. and O. had its through business going as soon as the flood subsided.

Speaking of it afterward, Dr. King said: "I thought if we were going to have a loss we might as well have a big one; besides that, we shouldn't have had much use for the engines if the bridge was gone."

SAMUEL L. M. BARLOW, a widely known lawyer, and intimate friend of ex-president Cleveland, died last Wednesday morning at Glen Cove, New York, from apoplexy. Barlow leaves a fortune between \$4,000,000 and \$5,000,000. Many anecdotes are told of the great retainers he has received. Two railroad suits are mentioned, from which he received \$50,000. He received \$25,000 for one hour's work at the close of the Franco-German war. Garrison and others had a contract with Gambetta to furnish 1,600,000 small arms. Before the contract was filled Gambetta fell. Thiers repudiated the contract, and the whole consignment of arms was about to be sold at auction, when Barlow was retained. In one hour he had a contract drawn, which all signed. The arms were shipped then to Algiers, and Barlow pocketed a fee of \$25,000 for his services.

A WASHINGTON special says: "After consulting with nearly all the Republican members, it has been decided to call an extra session of congress between October 15 and November 1."

The Hume Divorce Case.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 12.—The trial of the divorce suit of Lizzie K. Hume against Joseph Hume, the Berkeley capitalist and Columbia river salmon packer, has been commenced with closed doors, Judge Ellsworth presiding.

The parties were married about eighteen years ago, and for some years, until lately, resided in a comfortable house on Bancroft Way, Berkeley. It is said that recently the husband complained of her spending too much money in household expenses, blaming her for extravagance, and curtailed the allowance. This brought on an estrangement and he left her in possession of the residence, while he put up at a hotel. It is further stated that he offered her \$150,000 and not to sue for a separation, but it is stated that he is worth a million or more, and she would take nothing less than a quarter of that sum, as the property is said to be community property.

The case will be resumed on Monday next.

The Albany and Astoria Railway.

City surveyor W. B. Barr, one of the stockholders of the Albany and Astoria railway of this city, which was recently incorporated with a capital stock of \$1,000,000, commenced the work yesterday of the preliminary survey of the line. He has a party of fifteen men. They will make this city their headquarters for several days. The survey will start near the ferry, and will be run on a direct line through the northeast corner of Benton county, through Polk and a portion of Yamhill counties, to Tillamook, probably connecting there with the Astoria and South Coast railway.

The definite location of the route is the work undertaken by the surveyors, after which the company will secure the right of way. With this accomplished, the company has assurance that there will be no trouble in securing ample backing to carry the undertaking to its ultimate completion.

The people of Albany have heretofore exhibited remarkable enterprise in securing important railway connections, and if the Albany and Astoria railroad is pushed through to give this city, in addition to the harbor at Yaquina, an outlet at the seaport of Astoria, the result will be felt upon the commercial interests of Albany in a manner calculated to exceed the hopes of the city's future.—*Albany Herald.*
