THE prophetic utterance of Professor Brackett, of Princeton college, in his address to the Electrical club, of New York, last fall: "Notwithstanding the fact that in New York it is the law that all persons convicted of offenses that are punishable by death are hereafter to be executed by electricity, my belief is that never a single man will die, except by accident, by that method," seems likely to be verified. All the electricians of New York are now asking to have the new execution law declared unconstitutional. The legality of the sentence passed upon the murderer William Kemmer, who was to have been the first executed by electricity, has been disputed on the ground that the punishment is cruel. Evidence will be taken before a referee, and persons interested in electricity are now eagerly awaiting the result of the case and the evidence taken.

THE attention of our Democratic brethren who believe in swivel service reform is gently directed to the case of John Swett. He is the father of the common school system of California: he is a foremost educator of national renown: books of which he is the author are translated into foreign tongues because of their excellence. He is one of San Francisco's honored citizens, and a great educator. The Democratic board of education has given him the grand bonnet, cut off his head, and given his position to a lady, the wife of a gentleman to whom the Democratic board of education is under obligations for valuable political services rendered. Swett's scalp hangs at Boss Buckley's grille. In the meantime San Francisco Democrats beat their breasts and foam at the mouth in fuming fury over President Harrison's federal appointments. Is it right, oh men and brethren, to bring politics into schools: to discharge tried and faithful men to make room for political favorites? Or is swivel service reform something for Democrats to solely preach and Republicans to solely practice?

Rocks and Shoals. BRANCH U. S. HYDROGRAPHIC OFFICE, MERCHANT'S EXCHANGE, PORTLAND, OREGON, July 16, 1888.

EDITOR ASTORIAN: On April 4, Captain Noyes, master of the American ship Coloma, Hong Kong to Portland, discovered three rocks about forty feet high in latitude 32 deg. 50 min., north, longitude 140 deg. east, about twenty-five miles to northward and eastward of Onongon of Ango Island. Captain Lovett, of the brig Eagle is reported to have seen a pyramidal rock thirty-five to forty feet high, in latitude 32 deg. 40 min. north, longitude 139 deg. 37 min. east. The entire chain of islands which is shown on the charts as stretching southward from Tutuila, is comparatively unknown and require a thorough examination.

Some Further Remarks From Kilrain.

PORTLAND, July 17.—Richard Everding, who was recently elected police commissioner, and who presented a petition for a writ of mandamus, had the petition denied by Judge Shattuck this morning. Joe Simon is still on top.

A jury in the Sandy Olds murder case, was at last obtained by 10:30 this morning; the panel is now filled and stands as follows: J. T. Hughes, carriage maker; F. R. Neale, carpenter; J. L. Brobst, groceryman; Z. R. Moore, furniture dealer; J. L. Schutte, painter; William Dalton; Daniel Sellar, contractor; J. I. Birdsall, broker; R. R. Morrill, real estate dealer; Henry Griffin, laborer; and Peter Watt, carpenter, all of East Portland; and Kirk Sheldon, a merchant of this city.

Both counsel for prosecution and defense made arguments and the examination of witnesses began at one o'clock. A night session is being had, but probably the case will not go to the jury before to-morrow night.

KILRAIN HEARD FROM AGAIN.

BALTIMORE, July 17.—Kilrain arrived in Baltimore yesterday and has entirely recovered the effects of his recent battle with Sullivan. He does not show a mark of any kind. Kilrain said he was whipped squarely, but he thought he was largely the victim of circumstances. When asked if he thought he had been drugged, he said no. Johnnie Murphy, when asked the same question, answered mysteriously that there was something wrong, but that for the present his tongue was tied, but when the proper time came he expected to make some important revelations. "Have you got anything to say about Mitchell?" the reporter asked.

"Well he was not very attentive to say the least." "If you ever fight again would you have Mitchell for a trainer?" "No sir I don't know that I would, but I don't know that I will fight any more. I think I've had my share of it." In speaking further of the fight, Kilrain said: "I weighed 185 pounds when I went into the ring, and all talk about me only weighing 168 is all bosh. I knew that I had not been trained properly, and was not in a fit condition to fight Sullivan, but if I had not gone into the ring people would have said I was a coward. I meant to fight if it killed me. The crowd there was against me, and the referee while I think he is a square man, was partial to Sullivan, and knew nothing about the rules. Both he and the crowd kept all the time telling me to go up to Sullivan, and I went knowing I would only be knocked down. Of course the referee had no right to say a word, and under the rules I could have run all around the ring, but there was no one but little Murphy there to coach and I blindly went up and took my medicine. In fact I thought that I was knocked down repeatedly, but not being knocked out shows that Sullivan's terrible blows did not have the power some people suppose they did. I could have stood up longer, but Donovan threw up the sponge in his excitement, being afraid that I would be killed. My blows for some reason, did not seem to have any force. My arms seemed numb, but what was the matter I don't know for the life of me. The sun had a terrible effect on me, my back was one big blister after the fight."
