THE LATEST SENSATION.

International Trouble in Behring Sea.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 30.—The steamer *Dora* arrived from Behring sea last night, and brings the first detailed account of the capture of the British sealer *Black Diamond* by the United States revenue cutter *Richard Rush*, July 11, the *Rush* overtook the *Black Diamond*, and ordered her to heave to. The captain of the *Black Diamond*, refused to do this. Thereupon the commander of the ports and the turning out of the guns which caused the schooner to heave to.

Captain Sheppard and Lieutenant Tuttle boarded the English craft and asked for her papers. The officers of the *Black Diamond* offered no armed resistance, but refused to deliver the ship's papers. Captain Sheppard at once broke open the cabin and forced the hinges of a strong box and the captain's chest, thereby securing the papers which he wanted.

A search of the vessel disclosed 103 sealskins, which had been taken in Behring sea.

Captain Sheppard placed a non-commissioned officer from the *Rush* in charge of the *Black Diamond*, and ordered the vessel taken to Sitka to await further instructions.

The captain of the *Black Diamond* made a statement that when in Victoria he had been ordered to pay no attention in case he was overtaken by the *Rush* and requested to heave to. He said that he would not have surrendered if the *Rush* had had an inferior force to that of his own.

On July 13 the schooner *Triumph* was also boarded by Captain Sheppard, but no arrest was made, the skins on board the vessel having been captured in the Pacific, and not in Behring sea.

A passenger that arrived here on the steamer *Dora* last night said: "On our way down from St. Paul's island we saw six sealers, and the *Rush* was closely in pursuit of them. Undoubtedly by this time the *Rush* has made additional captures."

VICTORIA, B. C., July 30.—Captain McLean, of the *Triumph*, is rather reticent about imparting information relative to affairs in Behring sea. However, considerable has been learned from others on the vessel. It is asserted that McLean played the *Rush* a smart trick. The story is that when the *Rush* was sighted, there were thirty seals, dead, lying on the *Triumph's* deck. These were hurriedly skinned, and the pelts hidden amongst a large quantity of salt. This salt also formed a heavy coating to above 800 sealskins, which lay at the bottom of the schooner. Lieutenant Tuttle made an examination, but seeing nothing but salt, departed.

The captain of the seized *Black Diamond* refused to give up his papers, but was told he must submit, as the *Rush* had power to take her anyway.

The men on the *Triumph* say that Captain Dodd, of the *Maggie Mac*, had said he would fire on any American officers attempting to board the vessel.

When the *Triumph* left, seals were plentiful. A large number of seals had been killed, one vessel having taken fifty.

Lieutenant Tuttle told Captain McLean that he had seen five schooners entering Behring sea on the Fourth of July, viz: *Maggie Mac*, *The Triumph*, *Mary Ellen*, *Little L*, and *Black Diamond*. The latter was captured, but the fate of the others is unknown.

The *Corona* has arrived. Captain Carroll says when he left Juneau, Wednesday the British men-of-war *Suitors*, *Iarius* and *Amphion* were there. They left for Port Simpson on the following day. The *Corona* has heard nothing of the sealers.

A number of prominent sealing men waited on the captain of her majesty's ship, *Champion*, to-day, previous to his sailing for the north to join the fleet, and gave him full particulars in writing. He will convey them personally to Admiral Hennessy. A deputation also waited on Hon. John Robeson, provincial secretary. He has telegraphed to Ottawa, demanding the protection of the imperial government. Telegrams have also been sent by the most prominent public men of the province. The action of the imperial government is anxiously awaited.

MONTREAL, July 30.—The seizure of the schooner *Black Diamond* in Behring sea by the United States steamer *Rush* has caused a sensation here. Leading members of parliament say "the end has been reached. Canada can no longer submit to insults and seizures of her vessels on the high sea. We must show our hand. We have sufficient force in the northern Pacific waters to enforce any demand we make."

OTTAWA, Ont., July 30.—The greatest indignation is expressed in official circles at the late so-called American outrage reported from British Columbia, as having recently occurred in Behring sea.

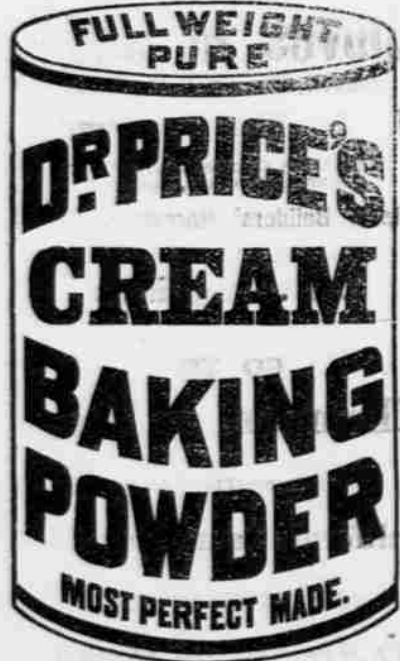
