THE BEHRING SEA SEIZURES.

Latest Concerning the Complications.

WASHINGTON, July 31.—Assistant secretary of the treasury Tichenor, in a talk with a Post reporter to-night about the Behring sea seizures, said: "There will be no child's play about this administration. The officers of the revenue cutter have plain, unequivocal orders. They will seize every vessel, American or British, found violating the law. Great Britain claims the right to the fisheries, it is true, but Great Britain is in the habit of claiming everything. The idea of redress or indemnity, under the circumstances is absurd. The matter will be treated as a small trespass."

Commissioner of customs Holliday said: "The only trouble is we have not enough vessels in Behring sea properly to defend the fisheries. No men-of-war, I think, are on duty in Behring sea. If anything is done by the English government it will probably be an offset to our claim to the Canadian fisheries."

BANGOR, Me., July 31.—Secretary Blaine passed through the city this evening. A reporter called his attention to the declaration in a Boston paper to-day to the effect that it would be impossible for the national government to sustain the pretension of secretary Blaine that the Behring sea is distinctly American water.

The secretary remarked it might be well for the paper in question to indicate the occasion, official or unofficial, where he had said anything at all on that point.

Mr. Blaine further stated that everything done on the far seal question since the 4th of last March was in literal compliance with the directions contained in the act of congress approved by president Cleveland on the last day of his term.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 31.—The announcement of the British sealer *Black Diamond* by the United States steamer *Rush*, in Behring sea, receives but little consideration in this city. "Statements about war and future trouble with England are given little hearing," said a prominent Englishman.

"Although our business is carried on in direct opposition to the Alaska Commercial company," said one of the leading salmon packing men this morning, "I believe in the present action of the United States government. The fisheries should be protected. The government has taken the proper step, but should have done so long before this. British and American pirates have decreased the number of our seals in Behring sea at least one-third since 1885, and they will totally extinguish them in two years more if the United States government does not continue to arrest them. England, in taking up this matter of protection to its Victorian sealers, will have to remember that 10,000 British subjects receive employment at the hands of the Alaska Commercial company, by its sending skins to England to be prepared. American sealers who are at present in the north do not receive much sympathy from people of this city. The class of men employed by them are not what would be desired in defending or encouraging the interests of the United States in the north. Vessels leave here generally with a crew of brigands, that do not hesitate at anything, and are always ready for a row. They depart with a small cargo of provisions and a load of whiskey, which, as has frequently been proven, is freely distributed among the natives, much to the latter's demoralization."

OTTAWA, July 31.—The cabinet yesterday considered the seizure of the British vessels by the United States cruiser in Behring sea. A demand will at once be made on the British government for two vessels to proceed to Behring sea to protect Canadian vessels from the United States cutters. Bonnell believes that several of the sealing schooners that sailed from Victoria are heavily armed, and will be able to protect themselves, as they started with the intention of not being taken without a desperate struggle.

THE REPORT DENIED.
OTTAWA, July 31.—The report that the cabinet has considered the Behring sea matter is untrue. The minister of customs has telegraphed Victoria for a report. As soon as it comes to hand a strong remonstrance will be submitted to the imperial government.

The report that the Canadian government had urged the adoption of a retaliatory policy in regard to the seizure of the schooner *Black Diamond* is untrue. The cabinet, after discussing the matter, forwarded two telegrams from Victoria to the governor general, with a request that they be forwarded to the colonial office. The cabinet also requested that her majesty's government should adopt prompt measures to protect British subjects on the high sea.

VICTORIA, B. C., July 31.—Great indignation is felt here over the seizure of the schooner *Black Diamond* in Behring sea by the United States cutter *Rush*. A public meeting will probably be held and resolutions passed for transmission to the imperial parliament, asking that the imperial government interfere in behalf of the British vessels engaged in the sealing trade.

It is believed here that if but one man has been placed in charge of the *Black Diamond*, her captain will

not obey the *Rush's* orders, and will sail for Victoria instead of Sitka. VICTORIA, B. C., July 31.—There is nothing new in the Behring sea seizure. The matter has been fully placed before the Ottawa authorities. What action they will take is, of course, unknown.

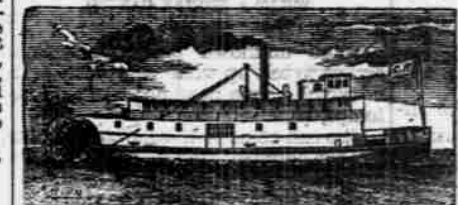
