YELLOW VS. RED FIR.

PORTLAND, Or., Feb. 9. To the Editor of Engineering News. In a recent number of the Chicago Rathway Review, a correspondent, in utation of Ayer's Pills. I am a manufacturer of timber at present, and built that portion of the Northern Pacific railway between Portland and Puget sound. On this 150 miles of road there is a very large proportion of trestle and Howe truss bridges. The first part of this road was built in 1871. Within three years afterwards I found a great many of the timbers in the Howe truss bridges had decayed, and on examination found they were red fir. have since noticed that the red fir stick in a bridge will not last more than one-third as long as the yellow

A great many eastern roads are getting from Oregon and Washington territory ties and bridge timbers, and they indiscriminately buy both red and yellow fir; in fact they make no distinction between these two kinds of timber.

In a short time there will be complaints that our fir timber on the Pa-cific coast is worthless, because of their failing to buy the yellow in stead of the red fir. The latter will last, as cross ties, at least eight or nine years, or as great a length of time as the best white oak; whereas the former will not last more than one-third that time.

I suggest to the railway companies in buying timber here, that they be careful to have an expert examine this timber and buy only yellow fir. As their habit is now, when they can make a purchase for \$2 or \$3 a thousand less, they are loaded up with the inferior article in a very large proportion.

In this connection I wish to submit the experience of Captain J. W. White, of the United States revenue marine service. He has superintended the building of all the revenue cutters that have been constructed on the Pacific coast, and he informs me that he never, in a single instance, put a piece of red fir in the construction of one of the government ves-

The following is his letter written to me from Oakland, Cal., under the date of February 2, 1889:

"The revenue steamer Wolcott was built at this port in 1873, under my supervision, of material obtained at the several lumber yards, but not cut expressly for ship building purposes nor can I now say whether it came from Oregon or Washington territory. It was, however, chiefly, if not en-tirely, of yellow fir that had been then deemed by far the most durable This vessel was carefully examined and repaired in 1884 under my supervision, the only decayed parts in the frame of the top sides along the boiler and engines span, and about the topgallant foreastle where water had been admitted, with no chance to dry out and no ventilation. She has been in commission since 1873, save the few months required to make the above named repairs and I have no doubt but that she is perfectly sound at this time."

The revenue steamer Corwin was

built at Portland, Or., in 1876, under my supervision, entirely of yellow fir. She has been in service since that time crusing from San Diego to the Arctic ocean, was carefully examined but a few months since by a board, Captain Hooper, an expert shipbuild-er, and myself. The only decayed timber found was in one timber forward and above the main deck line, and under side of plank on spar or quarter deck, both being from leak-

age and no chance to dry.' "The revenue steamer Rush, was built at Port Blakeley, Washington territory, in 1885, under my supervi-sion, also of yellow fir."
"Both the Cormin and Rush when

built, if in the merchant service, would have been rated 3-3, which is the highest class for thirteen years. The Corwin having reached that age, from the inspection above referred to her condition entitles her to the same rate for five years more without further inspection, and I feel assured the Rush will prove quite as sound when she has reached a similar age. Time has shown that the Wolcott would also have borne a first class rating; though, as above stated, the material of which she was constructed was not cut especially for ship build-

ing purposes."
"For fence posts or railroad ties, select the butts of large yellow fir trees, say from sixteen feet and up; let the sap be well dried not before placing them in position. I will venture to say that a large majority of them will be sound at the expiration of fifteen years, while the life of the red fir will not be over three years. No disinterested person can say less for the one and more for the other

"In conclusion, I wish to say that the strength of the yellow fir as a bridge timber is not excelled even by the oak of the eastern states. That has been demonstrated by the experiment made at the Mare Island navy yard in California. For railway ties it is fully as valuable as oak, and will hold a spike much longer."

Washington, Aug. 5 .- Belief here is quite general that the negotiations for the settlement of the Behring sea operovers; will be a tripartite arangement instead of a simple conference between England and the United States. The fact that the sea in question is bounded on the west by Russian territory brings the Musco-vite governo ent into the matter, and will result, in all probability, in an arrangement between the United States, Russia and England for joint control of the sealing grounds.

It seems to be a belief in well in-formed diplomatic circles that the state department, anticipating controversy over the right to control Behring sea, has alreedy communicated with the legations, and that by the time Sir Jalian Panacetote returns to Washington, arrangements will be perfected for a meeting of the three most interested governments, in which an agreement will be suggested for a division of the responsibility of protecting the breeding grounds of the seals. It is well understood that England is as much interested as the United States in preventing poschers from indiscriminately slaughtering the valuable animals, and while Russian interests in the northwestern waters are not to be compared with those of either of the other govern ments, she will be ready and willing

to join with both for the purpose.

Meantime there will be no modification of the policy of the United States, and revenue cutters will continne to seize ships of every nationality which may be found in the forbidden waters with seals on board.


