At its intersection with Court street, at a height of 48 feet above said base of grades.

At its intersection with 7th street at a height of 78 feet above said base of grades.

At its intersection with 8th street, at a height of 108 feet above said base of grades.

At its intersection with 9th street, at a height of 138 feet above said base of grades.

At its intersection with 10th street, at a height of 168 feet above said base of grades.

At its intersection with 11th street, at a height of 198 feet above said base of grades.

At its intersection with 12th street, at a height of 228 feet above said base of grades.

At its intersection with 13th street, at a height of 258 feet above said base of grades.

And unless a remonstrance signed by the owners of two-thirds of the property fronting on said street be filed with the Auditor and Police Judge within ten days after the final publication of this notice, to wit: on or before Friday, August 24, 1888, the Common Council will establish said grade.
