LONGING FOR HOME.

The Sad Story of An Old Danish Couple

NEW YORK, Aug. 7.—A gray haired Danish couple, Herrman Peterson and his wife Christiana, are resting in Castle Garden after walking all the way from Pittsburg. They want to go back to Denmark.

The old couple came from Hamburg three years ago. Then they traveled away out west to live with their married daughter, a farmer's wife at Okalla, Nebraska. After two and a half years their son in law had his arm cut off by a reaping machine, and he was no longer able to take care of the old folks. The home was broken up and the old people were thrown on their own resources.

They decided to go back to their old home in Denmark, but they were 5,000 miles from there. The people of Okalla raised a subscription and got together enough money to buy them tickets to Chicago. Then they fixed up a basket of eatables for the old folks and gave them \$4 to buy food with in Chicago.

The aged Dane kept the \$4 instead of buying anything to eat with it, and closed a contract with a Chicago railway company to take him and his wife to Pittsburg. After two months ago he reached Pittsburg a month ago penniless and without food.

Then the gray-haired man of 68, and his wife of 67, started to walk from Pittsburg all the way to New York. It is 500 miles by the shortest railway route. As the highways run it is 600 miles.

They set out on foot and slept in fields on the roadside. On stormy nights when rain poured down, farmers let them sleep in their barns. They had shelter on the month's journey only when it rained. Frequently they were refused food and sometimes they had to walk many miles, weak from hunger and almost fainting.

At last they got to the Orange mountains and saw New York. They walked over the Jersey meadows on a railroad track to Jersey City, crossed North river to New York City, and went directly to Castle Garden. The old man looked very neat after a long journey. As he told his story tears filled his eyes and the eyes of his wife.

Superintendent Jackson says emigrants who have been permitted to enter the country are never returned by the commissioners. The Danes in New York will probably look after the interest of the old couple.

Fate - Cole.

Asahel Cole took a very modest leave of this busy world, passing over the threshold of the Great Beyond almost unnoticed by a people to whom his name was once a household word. Yet he had established a valid title to a more lasting fame. He was "the father of the Republican party," the original, genuine, true progenitor of the greatest giant among political organizations. Mr. Cole's convention which met at the town of Friendship, in Allegany county, New York, in May, 1854, organized the new "Republican" party. It had a very modest beginning; it even related that the convention which gave to the new organization its conquering name was held in a bedroom. But the movement spread with lightning rapidity over the whole north. Within seven years the new party had elected and installed a president in the White house, and within eleven years it had liberated four millions of slaves, crushed the most gigantic rebellion of all history and saved this glorious union.

Asahel Cole did not always remain true to the party, the father of which he claimed to be. His admiration for Horace Greeley carried him into the Democratic wilderness in 1872, and though he returned to the Republican fold, things did not run to suit his taste. In 1884 he sailed in his tent, and in 1887 he formally transferred his allegiance to the labor party. But the campaign of 1888 resurrected the first and only true political love of the old man, and he shouted for Harrison and Morton with the enthusiasm of a vigorous youth.

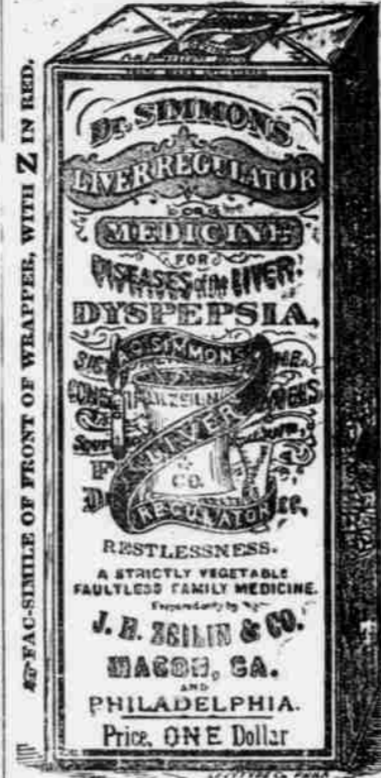

Arch Street Improvement.

NOTICE is hereby given that the Common Council of the City of Astoria propose to order the improvement of Arch street in the City of Astoria as laid out and recorded by J. M. 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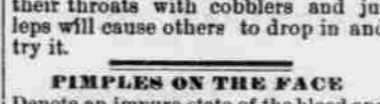
