ASTORIA, OREGON: FRIDAY, AUGUST 16, 1889. OF LOCAL IMPORTANCE.

THERE will be a commercial conference in San Francisco on the 29th of this month, of local interest to Astoria. It is the desire of the projectors of the movement to have then and there represented every commercial body on the coast.

The subjects for consideration are the manifest efforts of England to control the commerce of the Pacific, and the best means to adopt to extend and retain such trade on and for this coast.

Prominent among the topics to be discussed is the energetic construction of the Nicaragua canal as a means of national defense and commercial supremacy.

The completion of that canal would be worth some millions of dollars to Astoria and Clatsop county in increased commerce, enhanced lumber values and augmented commercial facilities.

Other topics to be then discussed—maritime defense of Pacific ports; encroachments of England in the south Pacific; permanent establishment of ocean mail steamship lines on Pacific waters; abolition of the bonding system for railway transportation through foreign territory, and kindred subjects to be brought before the conference aid in aggregating a series of commercial questions of sufficient importance to us at the gateway of the Columbia to justify sending a delegation from this city to attend the conference at San Francisco.

THREE THREADED NOZZLES.

They Must Be Used at the Firemen's Tournament.

George A. Burbank, secretary of the paid fire department, returned from Vancouver this morning. Secretary Burbank represented chief Rainey at the meeting of the directors of the Northwestern Firemen's association which was held in Vancouver, commencing last Saturday.

The director's meeting was held to take action concerning the tournament which is to be held in Tacoma next September. The directors of the association decided that the tournament should continue four days instead of three. This action was taken so as to give the judges plenty of time in which to make the awards. The tournament begins on September 16th and will continue four days, in accordance with their decision.

The most important action taken at the director's meeting was the barring out of the snap-nozzle. It was decided that nothing but a three-thread nozzle should be used. In many tournaments the snap-nozzle is allowed, and it usually causes disputes and trouble.

A company which has a snap nozzle saves from four to five seconds in a race, as the nozzle works automatically, while the company whose engine is fitted with the ordinary nozzle has to take time to make the connection. This causes an inequality which the directors of the association sought to overcome by entirely prohibiting the use of the snap nozzle.

Secretary Burbank says that the directors were especially pleased with the manner in which chief Rainey has arranged the prizes, which aggregate \$4,200. The first prize is to be \$1,000, which the directors thought would be sufficient to bring fire companies from the east to participate in the tournament. The Northwestern association comprises the companies in Washington, Oregon and British Columbia. Companies from anywhere in the United States or Canada will be allowed to enter the races providing they join the Northwestern association, which they can do by simply paying the membership fee of \$10. The directors decided to print bills and circulars at the expense of the association to advertise the coming tournament at Tacoma. They will advertise the tournament all through the eastern states and Canada, and do everything possible to make it a complete success.
