"Times ain't what they used to be," said a man to the writer yesterday. If he means that they are not as good as they used to be, or not as full of opportunities, he is mistaken. There were never better chances and openings for making money on the Pacific coast than there are right here to-day. It takes a little brains and requires a constant exercise of energy, but the reward is there.

"In the days of gold, in the days of old, the days of '49," in the days when whisky was two bits a drink, a few were favored by fortune: the multitude went broke. Luck predominated those days, now energy, industry and prudence win success.

Luck is also as potent a factor of sudden success as it ever was. The writer knows three men not yet 35 years of age, who three years ago didn't have \$100 of clear money in the world, and who, to-day, can each draw a check for \$50,000 apiece and get the cash.
