ASTORIA, Aug. 15, 1889.

PORT TOWNSEND, W. T., Aug. 23. The American schooner James G. Swan, belonging to the Makah Indians, near Cape Flattery, com-manded by Martin Benson, with an Indian crew, arrived here from Behring sea to-day,

The master reports that on July 30, in Behring sea, the revenue cutter Rush, overhauled him, took possession of the vessel's documents, firearms and 200 sealskins. The master was given an order, signed by Commander Sheppard, of the Rush, order ing him to proceed direct to Sitka and surrender the vessel to the collector of customs. The revenue offi-cer found about thirty-five fresh dead seals aboard the Swan. They were ordered preserved and left aboard the vessel.


