PROFESSOR WILSON, of Cornell university, says that whenever free trade shall be adopted by all nations, wages will be brought to the same level the world over. "and that level will be the lowest figure to which tyranny and misgovernment can reduce the laborers anywhere."

The importance of developing the production of tin and the manufacture of tin plate in this country may be seen from figures just made public, showing the amount of tin plate exported from England to the United States for the first six months of 1889—179,501 tons, against 140,224 tons in the same period in 1888, and 153,310 tons in 1887.

WHILE in the fourteen years from 1857 to 1870 the number of immigrants into the Argentine Republic was about 500,000, the total for the eighteen years from 1871 to 1888, inclusive, was 1,170,043, of whom about 29 per cent, have since returned to their respective homes, it is estimated that of the total number of immigrants about 550,000 are Italians, 122,000 Spaniards, 100,000 French, 20,000 English, 15,000 Germans, and 10,000 Belgians.

ADELBERT HAMILTON, a well known legal writer in New York, in a recent article reviews the methods of the great insurance companies; and he denies that there is really any competition which gives the insured the benefit of low rates. He enumerates fifty-six associations of agents (one of them a national association) which are "maintained for the purpose of regulating rates." "They are," says Mr. Hamilton, "almost without exception wrought into one gigantic insurance structure managed every year with more complete control and greater stringency." After an enumeration of them, he declares that some of them are clearly illegal and all are of doubtful legality because they are combinations to stifle competition and to keep the cost of a useful service to the people at a high price.

A Curious Underground Canal.

"The strangest canal in the world," says an English clergyman, "is one I never saw mentioned in any book or newspaper. It is a canal sixteen miles long, between Worsley and St. Helens, in the north of England, and is underground from end to end. In Lancashire the coal mines are extensive, half the country being undermined, and many years ago the duke of Bridgewater's managers thought they could save money by transporting the coal underground instead of on the surface. So the canal was constructed, the mines connected and drained at the same time. Ordinary canal boats are used, but the power is furnished by men. On the roof of the tunnel arch are cross pieces, and the men who do the work of propulsion lie on their backs on the coal and push with their feet against the cross bars on the roof. Six or eight men will draw a train of our five boats, and as there are two divisions in the tunnel, boats pass without difficulty."

TELEGRAPHIC.

PORTLAND, Aug. 26.—The Metropolitan railway company, who are building an electric motor line to Fulton park three miles south of the city, have purchased from the Traction railway company their franchise to lay down and operate a railway the entire length of Second street, to the railroad depot at the north end. The line outside the city limits is ready for track laying, and motors, iron, cars, etc., are on the way from the east. Work on the line through the city will be commenced shortly, and pushed with vigor, and the company expect to have the entire line from the depots to Fulton park running by the middle of October.

THE "RUSH'S" CAPTURES.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26.—It is believed at the treasury department that the captain of the *Rush* could not have been aware of the conduct of the officers of the *Black Diamond* in carrying off the prize crew to a British port or he might have adopted a different course with his last seizure, and accompanied his prizes with his own vessel into Sitka harbor.

THE DESERTED SAILORS.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26.—A full report has been received at the navy department from the commander of the United States steamer *Ossipee* in relation to the abandonment of the three men on Arenas Keys, Yucatan, by the schooner *Arma*. It has been found that the same schooner, committed this offense before, and the entire case has been turned over to the department of justice, with a request that the master of the *Arma* be prosecuted.

DISCONTENT AT MONTREAL.

MONTREAL, Aug. 26.—The *St. James Gazette*, which supports the government, devotes a long editorial to the subject of the seizures, and says: "If the United States desires to produce very strained relations with Great Britain, they are achieving a large measure of success. The seizures, which are eminently unfriendly and provoking, may, if persevered with, lead at any moment to a rupture of diplomatic relations between the two countries. The Washington government should not trade too far on the assumption that John Bull tamely submits to constant indignities." The journal strongly suggests the submission of the Atlantic and Pacific fisheries disputes to an impartial tribunal of able diplomats.

DON'T LIKE RIDICULE.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26.—Nothing has yet been received by the treasury department regarding the seizure of the sealing vessels in Behring sea, and as the mails cannot come down except by regular steamer nothing is expected for some weeks. There is a disposition on the part of government officials to criticize the policy which restricts the equipment of revenue marine vessels to so close a figure on men that few can be spared to escort the seized vessels to Sitka. The ridicule in the east over the action of the *Black Diamond* in carrying off the prize crew of one man is very trying to officials of the revenue marine service.

DANGER IN LONDON.

LONDON, Aug. 26.—Other trades are joining the striking dockmen. The carmen of Pickford & Co., general carriers and agents of the London and Northwestern and other railroad companies, are joining them. The laborers in Spratt's biscuit factory have struck, causing the entire stoppage of the works. All classes of unskilled labor in London threaten to join the strike. Trouble is feared. The police are preparing for a possible emergency.

MR. GORLEY WANTS TO KNOW.

LONDON, Aug. 23.—In the house of commons Mr. Gorley asked the under secretary for foreign affairs if it was true that a United States cutter had seized the British sealers *Pathfinder* and *Minnie* in Behring sea, and that other Dominion vessels engaged in the seal fisheries had been boarded and searched, and whether her majesty's government intended, prior to the recess, to state what measures were being adopted, and what diplomatic progress was being made for the purpose of arranging mutually with the United States and the Dominion a system of regulations, under which in future seizures might be made, or avoided in Alaskan waters, over which America claimed exclusive jurisdiction. Sir J. Ferguson stated that her majesty's government were in communication with the United States government on the subject.

It need scarcely be said that the seizure of the English sealing vessels by American captains is the subject of much remark and of many speculations, but it is not doubted that the communications with the United States government, to which the under secretary for foreign affairs alluded yesterday, will result in justice being done. Any attempt to force the subject upon the attention of parliament would be promptly discouraged by the government, and, indeed, by the house itself.
