PORTLAND, Sept. 9.—U. S. postal inspector E. B. Treutlen of San Francisco says the Spokane difficulty is settled.

The formal opening of the real estate exchange was had to-day. President Jas. Flower made the opening address.

### OLDS TO BE SENTENCED TO-DAY.

In the criminal court this morning H. Y. Thompson counsel for Sandy Olds convicted of murder in the first degree, for the killing of Emil Weber filed a motion for a new trial, on the ground that the verdict was against law and that the evidence did not justify the verdict. Counsel stated that he would not argue the motion as his filing of it was merely a formality preceding his presentation of the bill of exceptions upon which he purposes carrying the case to the supreme court. Judge Stearns overruled the motion and ordered Olds to appear before him for sentence to-morrow morning at 9:30 o'clock.

### THE HOLLADAY ESTATE.

Suit in connection with the Holladay estate was begun late last Saturday afternoon by Jas. Steel administrator against Joe Holladay, one of the receivers of the same to recover \$500,000 damages.

In his complaint Mr. Steele says that Joe Holladay has not been faithful to his trust as receiver inasmuch as he sold the stock of the Oregon real estate company, worth one million to Richard Koehler for \$334,000. Mr. Steele alleges that Joe Holladay induced his brother's widow to sanction the sale by promising to assign or transfer his judgment for \$346,686.46, against the estate as security for the money with which to redeem stock. He failed to do so and the stock has been wholly lost to the estate.

### A SAD MISHAP.

W. W. Shoffner, a freight conductor on the Southern Pacific was run over at the East Portland yard this morning at 11:45 and nearly killed. He was walking along on top of the cars as they were in motion, talking to the yard master who had just cut the train in two making a division between them. Shoffner was on that portion hitched to the engine, and thinking he could step over the cut attempted to do so but failing, fell between the cars and was run over by those which were cut off. The brakes were at once applied. Shoffner was taken out from under the cars with his right leg crushed above the knee and his left foot badly mangled. He was taken to St. Vincent where his right leg was amputated just below the thigh and his left foot dressed. The injured man was resting as well as could be expected after the operation under the influence of powerful opiates. It is thought he will pull through all right in course of time. Mr. Shoffner has worked for the company four years. He is 32 years of age, and has a family living at Roseburg. He has always borne the reputation of being an excellent man and has given the company splendid satisfaction. Nobody can be blamed for the accident but the victim himself. He was warned not to walk any farther on the cars, but went ahead of his own accord.

### AFRAID OF Nihilists.

LONDON, Sept. 9.—An entirely new imperial train has just been built for the emperor of Russia. The saloons are covered with iron outside, and then some eight inches of cork inside, instead of the steel plates with which the carriages of the old train were protected. All the saloons, which communicate by covered passages, are exactly the same in outward appearance, so that no outsider may be able to discover in which carriage the czar is traveling. WANT "IRISH" DROPPED.  
KINGSTON, Ont., Sept. 9.—The annual convention of the Irish Catholic benevolent union of America has begun here. The question which promises to create a lively interest will be a move to drop the word "Irish" from the title of the society.

THE "QUINNEBAUG" AND "JUNIATA" TO BE SOLD.  
WASHINGTON, Sept. 9.—Secretary Tracy has decided to sell the United States steamers Junjata and Quinnebaug, as the reports of the boards of survey showed they could not be repaired within 20 per cent. of the original cost.

THE "PETREL'S" FAILURE.  
WASHINGTON, Sept. 9.—The secretary has received another report of the trial of the Petrel, which confirmed the previous ones as to her coming up to the contract in the required horse power.

A HIDDEN SECRET.  
WASHINGTON, Sept. 9.—A curious story, which will again awaken interest in the celebrated Moen-Wilson case, which a year or two ago tore New England from circumference to center, has reached here. Every farmer who has paid royalty for years upon the barbed fence wire manufactured by the Washburn-Moen Manufacturing company, of Worcester, Mass., will remember the suits brought against Moen by one Wilson for the recovery of the value of notes given by Moen to the extent of \$50,000, and which the latter repudiated on the ground of no consideration. The testimony at that time showed that in the course of six years Moen had paid Wilson something like half a million dollars, and to the astonishment of everybody during the entire trial, the most searching cross-examination could secure from neither party, Wilson nor Moen, the reason why this money had been paid. Various theories were ad-

vanced, the most of them asserting that Wilson was paid to conceal some disgraceful episode in Moen's life. Wilson's case dropped through, and a second suit was brought in Providence, R. I., which also failed. The matter was then dropped.  
The general foreign agent of the Thomas Houston Electric Light company, who has just returned from France, where he spent a year putting in plants, is in Washington and makes the following statement: While in France he was obliged by his business to visit constantly the registry of patents, when he one day came across the fact that a patent for a barbed-wire fence had been in 1865 granted to Louis Francois Jancu. In 1869 Jancu came to this country in the interest of his invention. In 1870 patents for wire fence were granted to Moen in this country as original and without assignment. Then the earth opened and swallowed Jancu. He has never been seen since. A passage in one of Moen's letters to Wilson, read at the trial, instructs Wilson to "treat the third party well; clothe and feed him well, and allow him all the money he wants, and charge the same to me."  
This discovery is thought by the electric-light man to come near solving the Wilson-Moen mystery.
