ONE of the southern humorists and philosophers, "Bill Arp," lays it down as a fixed principle that "the negro was given a back seat by the God who made him, and he will keep it."

Iowa people ought to be reasonably happy this year. It has a big republican majority, is out of debt, its jails are nearly empty, and it has a great crop of nearly everything that grows.

THE Houston, Texas, Tribune thinks that "it will not be many years and the South, that is gradually but steadily developing its vast resources, will be more intensely protectionist than is Pennsylvania."

A MOVEMENT is on foot at Chicago to erect a million-dollar monument to general Grant and have his remains brought to that city, the monument to be unveiled at the opening of the world's fair. The proposition meets with general and enthusiastic approval.

NEGOTIATIONS are in progress at Minneapolis for the sale of the Pittsburg and Washburne mills, the West-side water-power and the Minneapolis and Northern Line elevators to an English syndicate. The only unsettled point is the value of the Washburne estate's interest.

THE sealing owners at Victoria denounce the story telegraphed to a San Francisco sensational journal that an organized raid was contemplated by them upon the seal islands in Behring sea. The piratical character of the undertaking stamped the story with falsehood, and it was not credited in this country.

THERE are in the East End of London nearly one million people, 10 per cent. of whom never know what it is to have enough to eat or have a regular home to live in. There are over two hundred thousand people in families of which the head never earns more than \$5 a week. When the rent is deducted from the earnings there is not enough left to buy any but the most wretched food, such as would cause indignation if it were offered to convicts here.

JOHN I. BLAIR, the New Jersey railroad king, who recently testified in a legal proceeding that he was worth from \$40,000,000 to \$60,000,000, says that he laid the foundation of his fortune by trapping when a boy. It was in 1809, while living on the homestead farm near Blairstown, that the spirit of money-getting took possession of him, and he began trapping for rabbits. He caught them by the dozen. The local market being dull, he walked to Easton, Penn., twenty miles away, and after dickering with the various merchants, sold a lot of skins for \$1. This was the first money he ever owned, and Mr. Blair declares that he then felt richer than he ever has since, despite his wealth.
