

Governor Pennoyer is not through with his railroad commission fight.

It will be remembered that last February the legislature elected a commission in accordance with the provisions of the amended railroad aw. The governor refused to recognize the commission and appointed one of his own, under the terms of the old law, holding that the new law, which he vetoed, was not operative until ninety days after the ad-journment of the legislature. It was held by the legislature that the passage of the bill over the veto carried the emergency clause with it, and put the law into effect immediately, the same as if it had not been visited with executive dissent. Since then the question has been in litigation, and the legislative commission has been successively sustained by the state circuit court of Marion county and the state supreme court.

The governor is now making what sailors call a new tack. The railroad law contains the following provision "And each of said commissioners shall also, before entereing upon the discharge of his duties, enter into bonds with security, to be approved by the governor, in the sum of \$10, 000, conditional for the faithful performance of his duty as said commis-Bioner.

The governor maintains that he has not approved the bonds of the commissioners, and has instructed Colonel Knight, his attorney, to be gin suit to enjoin secretary of state, MeBride from paying the commis-sioners their salaries, because they are illegally in office. The outcome of the latest and perhaps most in-teresting phase of this entertaining judicial muddle will be watched with mingled interest and anxietyest on the part of the public and anxiety on the past of the incumbent commissioners.-Oregonian, 19.

CHICAGO, Sept. 18 .- A Washington special says: Secretary Tracy made a decision this afternoon that will have an important bear-ing on the future building of war vessels. He decided to have the two 3,000-ton steel cruisers, provided for by the last congress, con-structed at Brooklyn and Norfolk navy yards. When the bids for these vessels were opened last mouth, it was found that all of the bids were largely in excess of the appropriations. Of the other vessel to be built in the near future, it is almost certain that one will be constructed at the Mare island navy
