THE ALASKA COMMERCIAL UO.

Louis Sloss of the Alaska Commercial company, in speaking of Alaskan matters, said yesterday: "Our lease expires on the 1st of May next, but if the present state of affairs con-tinues the company will not want to renew the lease, and I do not think any other company will. Illicit seal-ing is being continually and persist-

Alaska company has taken about one hundred thousand skins this year, a smaller number than usual. And not only are the seals becoming less, but they are smaller than formerly. Last season 1,700 casks were required to pack 100,000 pelts; this year the same amount of skins were put in 1,565 casks. Unless we could be guaranteed absolute protection against illeteed absolute protection against illegal sealing, we would under no cir-cumstances renew the lease."

"This is the first year that any in-surance has been placed in Onnalas. ka, and the rates are high. If a rev enue cutter should bring any captured sealers to Ounalaska, it is almost a foregone conclusion that a riot would occur there, and much damage would result by fire and destruction of property. Such an occurrence is pro-bable at any time, and the possibility of it happening is a standing menace to the people of Alaskan ports, owing to the criminal and brutal character of the outlawed sealers.

Regarding other industries in our Northern Territory, Mr. Sloss said:— "As it is with seals, so it is with salmon. It was thought that the Alas-kan salmon supply was inexhaustible, but the experience of this year teaches differently. The canneries have reduced the amount of salmon very materially. As an illustration, one establishment that last season put up 100,000 cases, was only able this year, even with more men and increased exertion, to secure 56,000 cases.

"Unlimited and unrestricted war on any species of animal, in land or water, will produce but one result— annihilation."

"There are some forests in Alaska, but on account of the distance, they will never be of any commercial im-portance until all the timber lands nearer to market have been denuded. Timber can never be brought from Alaska, while Washington or British Columbia have forests standing

"I am inclined to believe that Alas-ka must depend for her future prospects upon her mineral wealth. doubtedly, there are vast stores of gold and silver locked up in veins and lodes, and when the seals and salmon are no more, there will undoubtedly be a more systematic effort made to develop the hidden resources.—S. F. Bulletin. 12.



A RAILROAD LAND DECISION. Washington, D. C., Oct. 14.—Secretary Noble to-day rendered an important decision in the case of Samnel R. Childs vs. the Southern Pacific railroad company. Childs applied to make a homestead entry, which was rejected by the local officers at the Los Angeles land district in California on the ground that the tract was with are a positive cure for sick-headache and all liver troubles. The case came before the secretary on The case came before the secretary on an appeal from a decision by the com-missioner of the general land office, which affirmed the action of the local office in rejecting the application, up-on the ground that the tract was em-braced, at the date with the com-pany's rights attached under its grant, within the exterior boundary or claimed limits of certain Mexican private land grants known as the San Jacinto, Viejo and San Jacinto Nuevo; and being upon final survey and def, inite location of said grants subse-quently made, excluded from the limits thereof and thereby restored to the public domain, was subject to homestead entry at the date when appellant's application to enter the same was made.

The secretary, in his decision to-day, holds that the grants named were "floats" embraced within the outside limits of a larger area, and that if such larger area lies within the limits of said land grant made in aid of the railroad, such land grant would take effect, except us to the quantity of land or "float" actually granted in the Mexican grant; and if that quanlying together was left to satisfy the Mexican grant, the railroad com-pany would be entitled to patents for the odd sections of the remainder. The action of the general land office is therefore affirmed. This decision follows that of the supreme court in the case of the United States vs. McLaughlin, rendered May 14, 1888, and practically overruled as previous decisions of the interior department in similar cases.
