The United States senate committee on Pacific railroads consisting of senators Fry of Maine, Dawes of Massachusetts, Hiscock of New York, Davis of Minnesota, Butler of South Carolina, Morgan of Alabama and Hearst of California, reached Ogdenville yesterday on their way to this coast. It is in order for the chamber of commerce to invite them here when they get in this vicinity. They are all brainy men and can appreciate a fine site when they see it.

The newspaper man who penned the following knew what he was talking about: "The prosperity of a town is not graded by the wealth of its inhabitants, but the uniformity with which they pull together when any important undertaking is to be accomplished. A man with a thousand dollars at his command and a love for his town in his heart can do more for the building up and improving of it than the millionaire who locks up his capital and snaps his finger at home progress."

The salaries of nearly all the teachers in the public school in district No. 1 have been raised, at the same time that an additional teacher was employed, which adds much to the efficiency of the school. The roll of teachers, and the salaries now paid, are as follows: Prof. Pratt, \$100 per month; Miss Badollet, \$85; Misses McCormick, Powell, Cornahan, Levings and Brodie, \$80 a month each; Mrs. Bussey, \$65. Additional seats have been sent for to use in the new room recently added to the primary department.

The county court met as a board of equalization yesterday morning. A good many tax payers appeared and gave their views about the assessment roll, the majority opinion being, in effect: "It can stand it just as well as the others." Judge Page appointed Capt. J. H. D. Gray as agent for the county to sell the court house block and secure another site on which to build a new jail and court house. The board will be in session to day and to-morrow and the day after. If any one has any kick coming now is the time; don't wait till the board adjourns and then wish you'd known they were in session. Go now.

The newly elected directors of the Astoria and South Coast Railway Company met at 6:15 last evening. Wm. Reid was elected president; Dr. Alfred Kinney, first vice-president; May or C. H. Page, second vice-president; I. W. Case, treasurer; finance committee, Wm. Reid, I. W. Case, C. H. Page; executive committee, Dr. Alfred Kinney, J. W. Coan, D. K. Warren. Immediately after the election president Reid left for Portland on the Telephone, and leaves to-day for New York. Everything points to prompt and harmonious prosecution of the work. Arrangements are now being made for beginning tracklaying from the neighborhood of M. J. Kinney's cannery, and the intention is to have the rails from the city terminus westward laid as soon as possible.

Just for instance. Is it well to be perpetually finding fault with things? Do you make any money by crying down and belittling enterprises great and small? Is it business? Last spring there was a good deal of fun poked at the new schooner, *Bessie Rutter*. So much was said that Capt. Olsen had difficulty in getting a crew. Well, she sailed; was a success; but, remembering the send-off, he went to Victoria. He will likely stay there. The little vessel's disbursements are not much, but they count. Astoria has lost that. Last spring, also, an effort was made to make trouble for vessels fitting out for Alaska. The result was the expenditure of \$300,000 in S. F., that would have been spent here. THE ASTORIAN doesn't believe in post mortems, and only refers to these things to say, don't croak nor whine, nor try to keep people from starting up enterprises. If you can't do it yourself, don't deter others from working. The town must have enterprises or it can't go ahead. Telling about the winter of '43 is very entertaining, but the progress of '89 is more interesting to a good many people.

Spend your money at home. It is your home; you cannot improve it much by taking your money away to invest. There is no way of improving a place so much as by encouraging good merchants, good schools and good people to settle among you, and this cannot be done unless you spend your money at home, for there is where you got it. Set the example now. Buy your dry goods, groceries and everything else procurable in town; your merchants are your friends; they stand by you in sickness and trouble, and they are your associates. With-out your trade they cannot do business.

A FINANCIAL REPORT. Of the Recent Firemen's Tournament. A report has been furnished THE ASTORIAN for publication, of the finances of the hose team at the recent firemen's tournament at Tacoma, from which it appears that the receipts were as follows: Collected by subscription, \$626.75; Rescue No. 2's, 238.00; Rec'd from P. W. Weeks, 138.00. Total, \$994.75. The following is the statement of expenses: Telegrams, \$17.55; Tickets, 278.50; Board, 238.30; Rooms, 88.50; Expense, supplies, etc., 274.65; Shoes, 66.50; Express, 26.00; Washing, 6.00. Total, \$996.10. Leaving \$135 more paid out than received, so that the tournament cost the participants about \$1,000.

Shortly, before the tournament the Astoria Iron Works, on the occasion of the fire at their establishment, gave chief engineer Weeks \$150, as an appreciation of the successful efforts of the department in putting out the fire. In the expense account above, the \$138 received from P. W. Weeks, is a part of that \$150, which he turned over to the hose team. The remaining \$12, he paid for music at the dance at the armory the night of the reception and banquet at Rescue's parlors.

MARINE NEWS AND NOTES. The bark *Cora* arrived at San Francisco from Cook's Inlet, Alaska, last Saturday. She encountered heavy weather, and had to throw overboard 500 cases of salmon of her cargo to get the leak above water. The steamer *Clara Parker* is busy. She came down from Portland last Sunday with 40 M. brick, 50 barrels lime, and other freight. Yesterday she took the schooners *Ida* and *Ella* to Skamakawa, to load lumber for San Francisco, and to-day will bring down the loaded schooner *Eureka*.

Out of the crew of 60 men, on the U. S. fishery steamer *Albatross*, there are only some 20 native born Americans. This fact lends weight to the recommendation of the recent commercial conference at San Francisco, that an apprenticeship system be introduced in the American merchant marine.
