Repeal of The Pre-Emption Law.

NO HOUSEHOLD SHOULD BE WITHOUT BISMARCE, N. D., Nov. 15,-The point was informally raised to day by F. M. Dudley, of the legal department of the Northern Pacific railway in the United States land office, that the pre-emption law had been re-pealed by the act of congress provid-N ing for the admission of the new states. It looks as if it were intended to repeal the eighth section of the act of 1841 as to the donation of 500, 000 acres of public land to the new states for public improvements, but the text includes not only the repeal of the section but of the whole law. The land department has not had its attention called to it yet, but it is cer-tain that the commissioner will be called upon for an opinion, and if this opinion is adverse the question will be carried into the courts.

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
Racing Around The World.
