Especially when the proposition involves the overturn of old and cherished habits, or the destruction of theories that have long been held. it is better that it should meet with whatever resistance is sincerely offered. If it contains elements of true progress it will become established all the more firmly for the patient waiting; if it do not its fallacy will be the sooner and the
