Farrer, is on the Ilwaco route, and leaves Parker's dock at 2:15 every afternoon except Sun-The State of California sails for San Francisco this morning with the follow-ing freight: 4,000 cases salmon, 1,200 bbls shooks, 150 also oysters, 125 boxes apples and 6 tons assorted truck.

The four-masted schooner Douglas Dearbora sailed to-day with \$40,000 feet of lumber from the Port Blakeley mill company, for Philadelphia. This is the first cargo of Paget sound lumber taken to that city.

PORT TOWNSEND, Duc. 5.—The steam schooner Jennie arrived from San Fran-cisco this afternoon. The captain states that he passed very close to Race rocks, expecting to see the wrecked steamship Idaho, but nothing was visible. She has slidden from the rocks and sunk to the bottom of the sea. This, in all probabil-ity, ends the career of the Idaho. The captain and the crew abandoned the steamship yesterday.
