In the city treasurer's office, yesterday there was a balance on hand as follows: general fund, \$6,883.25; police fund, \$3,621.72; street fund, \$3,976.09; bond interest fund, \$1,153.55; cemetery fund, \$469.81; special fund, \$1,508.97; total, \$17,608.70, now in the treasury. There are outstanding warrants to the amount of \$15,000. About \$6,000 of the \$17,608.70, is applicable to the payment of these warrants, as they are drawn upon the general fund.

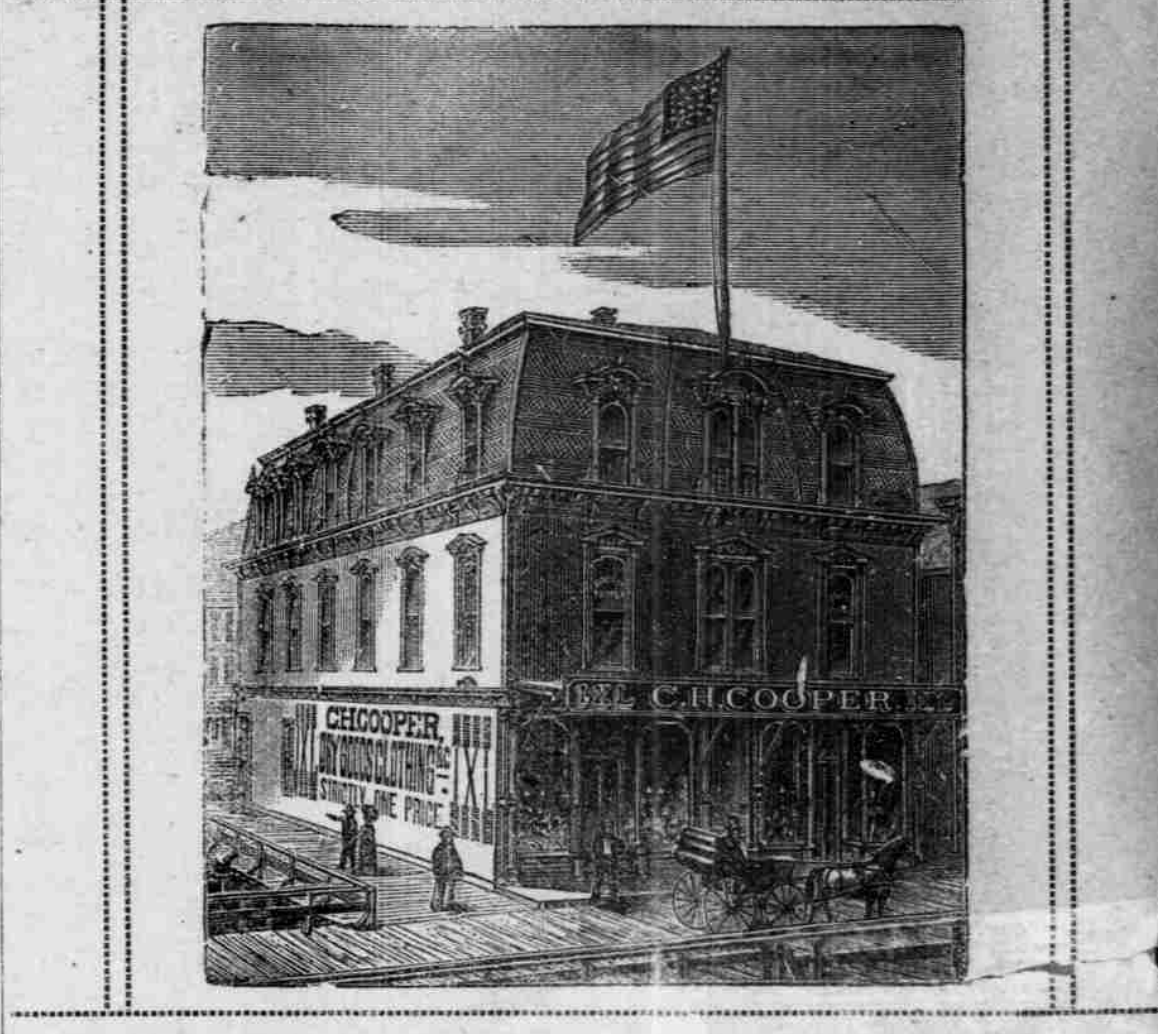
