Coal is brought from Buffalo, New York, by schooners to Duluth for forty cents a ton and lumber at \$1.50 a thousand. The prevailing rates now from the Sound ports to San Francisco are: Coal, \$2.75 a ton, lumber \$4 per thousand. The distance in both cases are about the same, being approximately 850 miles.

The third bridge at Portland over the Willamette has been contracted and will be completed next June. It will consist of six spans of 320 feet each, including approaches it will be 2,270 feet in length. The bridge is a highway and foot bridge and will also be used by the Hawthorn Avenue & Woodstock motor line.

In consequence of the enormous production of beet-sugar in Europe during the past year, it is stated that the prices of granulated sugar in this country will be lower in 1890 than ever before. Cane-sugar until recently formed the entire supply of the world. Now the supply of beet-sugar is far in excess of that manufactured from cane.

PRESIDENT VAN HORN, of the Canadian Pacific railroad, thinks that a journey around the world will be made in thirty-eight days within a few years. This will be when the great trans-Asiatic railroad across Russia is completed, with ships crossing the Pacific in five days and the journey from the Atlantic to the Pacific made in four days, which can be done to-day. All that will be needed will be close connections between boat and rail at every point.

The schooner Union, built in 1850 of Douglas fir, by Hall Brothers, of San Francisco, has been recently overhauled and the timbers found to be as sound as when built. The Ellen Adelta, built in 1863, after twenty-five years received a thorough examination, showing that every plank and timber was sound as when first put into position. Ship builders uniformly recommend this wood for its strength, elasticity and durability. The Union Iron Works of San Francisco used this wood for the decks of the United States warship Charleston and they express the opinion that it has no equal for building ships.

A PUGET SOUND paper draws a pretty picture when it says the time is not far distant when every hillside in Washington will be golden and green, scarlet and purple with fruit, and the fruit will be spoken of in all languages that have a literature, and spoken of only in praise. Every orchard in the world will be praised as its productions approach, or condemned as they fall below, those of Washington's fruit forests. The same applies with equal force and beauty to Oregon. Fruit upon our hills are no longer experimental crops, and every year the acreage planted in this profitable, delicious, healthful crop increases its extent and ratio. This year the plant is unprecedented.

YESTERDAY evening the chamber of commerce formally endorsed the proposition to transfer the revenue marine service of the United States to the naval establishment. In this, the chamber appears to be acting in unison with other commercial bodies throughout the union. It is claimed that the transfer embraced in the bill of senator Chandler now pending, is in the interests not alone of the officers of that branch of the service, but in the interests of the country as well, and the claim does not appear to admit of successful contradiction. Economy, efficiency and trade justice are embraced in the proposition; the guarding of our coasts and protection of our commerce are partially involved in the question, and every dictate of national progress in this line points to the advisability of affirmative action upon this bill.

How Barnum Outwitted the Canadians. "Do you know why P. T. Barnum is unpopular in Canada?" asked a theatrical agent. "I will tell you. There is a heavy duty on posters in Canada, and the showman who takes a large quantity of printed matter into the dominion is under an enormous expense. Barnum determined to avoid the exaction. He planned a Canadian tour for 1888, and two years before he sent lots of posters to Canada and neglected to pay the duty. The stuff lay in the custom house without being called for, and at last the officials decided to advertise it for sale at auction. Barnum sent an agent to the sale to buy up the show bills, and he did so at a bargain. The secret leaked out, and that's the reason the patriotic citizens of Canada are down on Barnum."
