## A TANGLED TRACK.

The Storm "a Waterloo" For the  
Southern Pacific.

**FRESH TROUBLE AT GLENDALE.**

PORTLAND, Feb. 8.—The situation  
of the railway blockades remains  
unchanged. Messrs. Brandt and Kohler  
of the Southern Pacific railway  
company visited the scene of the wash-  
out on their line from East Portland  
this morning and now have a large  
force over making repairs which will  
be completed within three or four  
days. The track is completely washed  
away from N street to U, a distance of  
over 1/2 of a mile.

"I would be a happy man," said Mr.  
Brandt, "if that worst which we have  
met with. We have found a Water-  
loo sure enough and there is abso-  
lutely no telling when we can get our  
through trains in motion. Our facili-  
ties for securing reliable reports from  
the wrecked positions of the road are  
so inadequate to the situation that I  
cannot say just what condition the  
road is in, but I feel sure I could  
hardly be worse. We are hiring all  
the men we can find and will do our  
utmost to make speedy repairs."

The road is now in a serviceable con-  
dition from the junction to Rose-  
burg, but beyond the latter place it is  
just the reverse. False trestle work  
bridges will be put in where the cuts  
cannot be made quickly through the  
landslides. The road will run around  
the obstruction until the earth can be  
removed. Two years ago a breach of  
two miles was made in the trestle work  
of Cow Creek canyon, the scene of the  
great trouble at the present. In three  
days time trains were passed over  
the false work which had been put in.  
There is little prospect now that a  
Southern Pacific train will be run  
either way between here and San  
Francisco before a month has elapsed.

**On the Union Pacific Line.**

Not less than two miles of land  
slides have occurred during the pre-  
vailing "reign of terror" along the  
Union Pacific, between here and The  
Dalles. The worst places are, of  
course, in the vicinity of Bonneville  
and Cascades. Large forces of men  
are now at work with steam shovels,  
and all other appliances, cutting away  
debris and building bridges and  
trestle work. On one cut a curve will  
be made from the main line normal  
to the land slide until the earth can be  
cleared away. The calculation is that  
by next Monday night a train will  
possibly be able to start. The  
scheduled "Grant's Pass," saying "I  
leave the Dalles for Portland. The  
scheduled trains cannot be sent out  
for a week.

At present all Union Pacific freight,  
passengers and mails destined for  
Portland are put aboard the *Harned*  
*Queen* and transferred to the Port-  
land boat at the portage railway at the  
Cascades.

Taken altogether, the railroad situa-  
tion is about as bad as it could possi-  
bly be, and high as they have been, or  
for that matter, turbulent as they  
continue to be, the rivers are the only  
agents able to act as a highway by  
which Portland can be reached from  
the south or east.

**Has a Tale Worth Listening To.**

PORTLAND, Feb. 8.—A. G. Schwatka,  
uncle of Lieut. Frederic Schwatka,  
of Arctic fame, left Yreka, California,  
some three weeks ago, bound north on  
snow shoes. Nothing was heard from  
him, and his friends began to think  
he had perished in the snow. There  
was talk of organizing a search party,  
but to-day his friends received a dis-  
patch dated "Grant's Pass," saying: "I  
am coming. I made the whole dis-  
tance on snow shoes. I have a tale  
well worth listening to, to tell when I  
see you."

**Will Prosecute This Time.**

PORTLAND, Feb. 8.—This afternoon  
Sheriff Kelly arrested Herman Lewis,  
employed in a fiduciary capacity by  
C. H. Lane & Co., mer-  
cantile tailors, on a charge  
of embezzlement. The sheriff  
had considerable trouble finding him.  
He has been in the employ of Lane &  
Co. for some months and it is es-  
timated that he has despoiled the firm  
of between \$1,500 and \$2,000. The  
house had been similarly treated by  
another employe without prosecuting  
him, but on this occasion are deter-  
mined to prosecute the offender.

**A BIG LAND SLIDE.**

**More Trouble on the Southern Oregon Rail-  
road Track.**

ASHLAND, Or., Feb. 8.—A report has  
reached here from Glendale, that an  
immense slide has occurred on the  
railroad half a mile southwest of the  
fork of Cow Creek canyon. The slide  
came from a high mountain down to  
the bottom of the canyon, a distance  
of 800 or 1,000 feet covering the track  
and filling the canyon.

The report says that the trees are  
standing on the slide the same as they  
were when it started from the summit.

## THE STATE OF BUSINESS.

The Financial Status—The Commer-  
cial Outlook.

**A VERY FAVORABLE SHOWING.**

NEW YORK, Feb. 8.—A special tele-  
gram to *Breadstreet* indicates a mod-  
erate improvement in general mer-  
chandise east of the Rocky mountains  
with more reasonable weather and  
consequently a more active demand  
for staple goods. Prices of cattle and  
hogs generally tend lower, on a free  
movement. Wheat is depressed on  
the Pacific coast by free offerings, and  
large interior stocks. Groceries, dry  
goods and drugs are fairly active.  
Iron prices are fairly steady on the  
belief that the demand will increase  
at an early date; but anthracite coal  
is barely steady, with no improvement  
in the demand for domestic purposes.  
The industrial situation is attracting  
attention, with an increasing number  
of employes on a strike, and an out-  
look for a strike of considerable pro-  
portions May 1st, and in case a gen-  
eral concession is not made that eight  
hours shall constitute a day's work.

The price movement continues fair  
and regular, as for several months  
past. Wall street has been abandoned  
to professional operators during the  
week. The bears have been most  
active. Money has been quiet and  
easy.

Notwithstanding the decrease in the  
New York bank surplus reserves, and  
high rates of discount at London, the  
brightest spot in the street has been  
active demand for railway bonds, or  
two new loans having been sub-  
scribed for twice over.

The bank clearings at thirty-five  
cities for January aggregate \$5,130,044,  
944, or 7 1/2 per cent. more than in Jan-  
uary, 1889, 10 per cent. more than in  
December last, and are exceeded only  
by the monthly totals as in October,  
1889 and December 1886.

Reports to *Breadstreet* show 1,781,  
707 pounds of flour in stock in first  
and second hands at 53 cities Feb-  
ruary 1st, an increase of 17,931 barrels  
since January 1st. *Breadstreet's*  
report of available stocks of wheat  
east of the Rocky mountains in the  
United States are 42,277,927  
bushels larger and on both coasts 3,  
977,169 bushels larger.

*Breadstreet's* totals, with Beerholm's  
report of stocks in Europe and about  
there Feb. 1st, show a decrease of 5,  
539,883 bushels during January, or 9 1/2  
per cent and a decrease of 13,925,585  
bushels compared with Feb-  
ruary 1st, 1889 or 11 1/2 per cent.  
Exports of wheat and flour as wheat  
in the United States since January 1st  
is 20,214,287 bushels against 1,163,854  
bushels last week.

The total shipped July 1st to date is  
61,032,628 bushels against 59,455,900  
bushels in like portions of 1888-89.

Dry goods are more active at Bos-  
ton, and to a lesser degree at New  
York, but trade as a whole does not  
equal expectations.

Wool is inactive, with prices favoring  
the buyer, particularly on pulled  
and territory grades.

There are larger port receipts and  
weaker cables, save depressed cotton  
prices, at all markets except New  
York.
