A bill providing for the selection of townships in Alaska has been passed by congress. It provides for the purchase of 100 acres of land as nearly as practicable in a square form for townships at \$2.50 per acre. They may then be divided into town lots and incorporated as a town, either personally or in connection with any incorporation which may be formed. The bill was amended to exclude lands occupied by natives, mineral lands, such lands as the fish commissioner may select, Kodiak or Atoqnak islands, for the purpose of fish culture, and also Pribylov island.

The Milton Eagle, in its editorial notes, among other things, prints the following: Walla Walla is arranging for extensive advertising in divers magazines and newspapers, the project to be carried out when spring opens. If the board of trade of that city had the acumen of a supernumerated packman, they would recognize a more potent medium in the home papers, and decorate their plumes with a healthy tint. While the wistful wall of the home paper is echoing through a wide circle of exchanges, the expenditure of money on outside barn-storming is simply a useless and wasteful outlay.

AMONG TURNER, a bad man in Nevada in early days, died in bed, in Reno, on the 7th inst. He was a kingly among the toughs, and had nerve enough for a dozen men. Once, in Pioche, he was keeping cases at a faro game. A man put a revolver to his head, told him he had but two minutes to live; meant it, too. Turner dropped his hands, began a fervent prayer to the Almighty, and then, like a flash, pulled a revolver from his belt and killed the man before he could press the trigger of the revolver that he held against the side of Turner's head. Such little traits of character made ordinary men careful of repressing Turner, and when he moved his actions were always an object of interest to people in his immediate vicinity.

The government should make up its mind at once that it must spend large sums of money in the northwest. There is complaint at Washington because this section wants so much. This is not just. The east has been securing the major part of the appropriations for the last century. The central west has had a large share during the last fifteen or twenty years; but the extreme west, especially this section, has received but a trifle. Harsh demands for improvement, rivers must be dredged, cities must have public

buildings. If we do not get these aids now, we will not be obliged to wait many years. The tremendous importance and growth of this section will absolutely compel them, while our representation will be greater in congress and our influence thus increased.

If attracting unusual attention speaks well for the new states, they certainly ought to achieve a creditable reputation. But we fear for the contrary. With a heavy indebtedness in North Dakota, runaway legislators in Montana, a nondescript assembly in Washington, and a crowd of land boomers in South Dakota, surely conditions have combined to give these states a questionable notoriety. They seem to be making up for lost time, or rather they are, as in the case of the Washington legislature, losing time which they can never make up. It is the same old story of youth and inexperience. When another generation has passed away these amusing incidents of the present will serve as an invaluable source for the stories of the future.

All this is Very Amusing.

There is nothing new in the situation. Packers and dealers still are discussing the prospect for the new season, and there seems to be some division of opinion among them. The majority hold to the belief that the season promises well for the industry in all its branches; but there are a few who make the prediction that the new canner companies and their fishermen will crowd the streams to the damage of the industry generally, if it does not precipitate troubles among the fishermen such as were experienced some seasons since on the Columbia river, when one man fished and the other held the rifle. It would be better for the packers to arrange these matters beforehand if possible. It is not right to arm men and send them out with instructions to protect themselves. It is more than likely that there will be conflicts between the old fishermen and the new on all streams. There will not be fish enough for all, and the old timers, quite naturally perhaps, will put in some claims of right to fish the streams. The new comers will claim that the birds in the air and the fish in the sea, in a state of nature, belong to those who can take them. The old timers will retort with, why don't you take them? This will be the signal for a row. Somebody will get hurt and nobody will get any salmon. To make a long story short, there will not be a large supply of salmon on any of the streams this coming season if experience is any guide. The Sacramento and Columbia rivers are making lighter and lighter packs every year. Alaska is the main dependence of the packers. Many of the new companies will pack in Alaska, but in all probability one season in the frozen north will knock all the enterprise and ambition out of them, and they will leave salmon packing to the companies that have made a business of it for years. -Salmon Talk in San Francisco Grocer and Canner, 15.
